EU Referendum 2016

- Delivered successfully under immense pressure
- Tower Hamlets Voting Area RCO for London
- All staff employed were trained online training for POs/PCs and reserves
- Polling Station Inspectors received dedicated training
- Count staff facilitated training with counting of ballot papers
- High volumes of registration and absent vote applications
- Registration applications from 1 April 9 June 2016
 Online 43,130
 Duplicates 7,402 (17.2%)

Deletions = 10,557 (24.48)

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Planning and Management

- The planning, management and implementation of two major elections in a seven week period presented a major challenge for the Electoral Services team
- Election plans and contingency/risk registers in place
- Registration extended registration period due to online system crash affected determination dates
 - Postal vote applications highest number ever, but lowest rejection rate (4.6%)
 - Staffing difficulty finding experienced staff available during holiday period and Ramadan
 - No allegations of electoral malpractice or alleged fraud









Local Practices

- Joint working/planning with Council services, local Police and Met Police
- Local Police Officers present at every polling place from 7am – 10:30pm
- Exclusion Zones marked to avoid intimidation/crowds
- Hourly line marked across the corresponding numbers list to assist police with any allegations of personation
- 6+ electors checks two weeks before the referendum to ensure an up-to-date register is used at polling stations
- Registration days at Idea Stores and regular local newspaper advertisements to promote awareness

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Polling Day – 23 June 2016

- Polling Day: Thursday 23 June 2016 Floods (am) deployment of emergency contingency plans
- 75 polling places 104 polling stations across the borough
- Eligible electorate = 167,820 (no European Union citizens)
- Postal Voters 31,211
- Postal vote return 77.23%
- Postal vote rejection rate 4.6%
- Proxy Voters 1,204
- Overseas electors 2,027



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Table to show the relationship of votes per count staff to the declaration time



What does the table tell us?

- The blue bars show the ratio of votes to count staff the shorter the bar, the fewer votes each counting staff
 had to count
- The general trend shows that the lower the ratio of votes to counting staff the earlier the declaration time
- If there was a direct relationship the table would show blue bars going continuously upwards
- But it is not a direct relationship the shortest blue bar does not give the earliest declaration time
- This means there are other factors that influence the declaration time

What other factors can influence the declaration time?

There are a whole range of factors, here's a few:

- Speed of getting the ballot boxes into the count and allocated to a counting team
- The total number of ballot boxes.
- The number of count staff allocated to each ballot box
- The method of counting (mini-counts, what size)
- Speed of individual counters
- Number of supervising staff
- Requirements for form filling
- How the results are calculated and checked the accountants
- Timing of adjudication (e.g during the count or at the end)
- Tolerance / variance
- Layout of the count
- Speed and method of decision making
- Recounts

The Branch Secretary, Tower Hamlets UNISON has asked that the Committee be made aware of the following comments on Item 3.2 from tonight's agenda-Organisation Structure.

Unison Comments On Item 3.2 - Organisation Structure

- 1. We have had a very short period of time to look at this proposal. Our first concern is the paucity of information. We have asked for, but not been provided with, a copy of the current structure that this will replace. Without this it is not entirely clear where existing posts will be deleted. Our concern on this is not solely or predominantly about the impact on current individual post holders but the implications for the services themselves.
- 2. It is not clear to us that even at a senior managerial level there has been much scope for input and an initial glance at the proposed structure would raise concerns for example: does locating Ideas Stores under a customer access AD imply a dilution of the critical role they play in learning and cultural activity in favour of a model we see in some other places of a type of One Stop Shop approach which may not suit the needs of Tower Hamlets; do all sports, leisure and culture sit well in Children's or Community Safety in Adults; does such a wide remit as regeneration, housing and economic regeneration provide adequate recognition of the need for high level skills and experience in critical areas with quite distinct needs; does subordinating benefits within a wider revenues role have implications for a function that provides vital support in our local community. Are you being asked to reach potentially quite far reaching decisions on limited information?
- 3. Also it is not clear whether the Assistant Director level represents a change in management level and pay or a change in nomenclature. It would appear hard to justify any creation of a higher tier of management when staff are being expected to take on wider roles at lower levels of the structure usually without any increase in pay.
- 4. It is not clear what is being proposed in relation to assimilation other than that interviews may be appropriate and that the process below Chief Officers will be the responsibility of the Chief Executive. We would expect a transparent process where equal criteria apply, recognising that criteria may vary at some levels (for example the requirement for member appointments). For the avoidance of doubt it would seem to us to be potentially automatically unfair if more recently appointed officers were to be given direct assimilation claims but more longstanding officers given no claims or to be required to compete at interview.
