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

1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apology for absence was received from Cllr Shiria Khatun

2. DECLARATIONS OF DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS

There were no declarations of disclosable pecuniary interest but Members of the Committee declared personal interests as they knew some of the applicants applying for the positions of Local Authority Governor. Full details in Part 2 minutes.

3. UNRESTRICTED MINUTES

The unrestricted minutes of the ordinary meeting of the General Purposes Committee held on 17 June 2013 were agreed as a correct record of the proceedings.

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4. UNRESTRICTED REPORTS FOR CONSIDERATION

4.1 Polling Place Review

At the request of the Chair, John Williams, Head of Democratic Services, presented the report and highlighted the following:

- The report was a progress report and provided an update on the review of polling districts and polling places, and the representations received during the consultation.
- A lot of representations were received which affected two thirds of the wards. Officers were still in the process of reviewing all proposals and visiting new polling stations in order to decide on their suitability, this was a huge undertaking which has to be completed thoroughly.
- A Members seminar was held as part of the consultation process which produced numerous suggestions which were being reviewed.
- Officers were still in the process of working out final recommendations on polling arrangements which would be brought back to the December Committee meeting.

A discussion followed which focused on how the new changes would be publicised. In response to questions John Williams and Louise Stamp gave the following answers:

- Household canvassing would start next week and would continue through to mid-February 2014. The new polling details would therefore be published on 17th February 2014. There would be two versions available, current councillors would continue to receive updates of the electoral register for their current ward, whilst all candidates for the 2014 elections would be issued with the updated register based on the new ward arrangements.
- The Council had delegated powers to the GP committee relating to electoral matters. The final recommendations for new polling arrangements on polling stations were delegated to the Returning Officer, John Williams.
- All representations would be investigated; however there was a lot of conflicting information which had to be reviewed and verified to ensure that no properties had been missed before final recommendations will be made. It is likely that the final report would be ready before the December Committee.
- Canvassers would visit all properties, including new build complexes.
 All Council tax forms are sent out with a registration form, however it
 was likely that there would continue to be people changing addresses
 from now to the election date, hence the Council had applied for a
 grant from the Cabinet Office to enable the Authority to send out
 confirmation letters at the end of February 2012 to ensure the register
 is up-to-date.
- All polling stations that were previously used but are no longer being used will display full details of new polling locations on polling day.

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Confirmation letters and polling cards would provide residents with the full information on the changes to new wards and new polling stations. All Idea stores in the borough would be advertising information on their plasma screens.

- Newspapers like East End Life would be used to inform the public of upcoming changes. There is a big communication strategy being rolled out, as there would be 3 elections on the same day that voters needed to be made aware of, as well as the recent boundary changes which had altered the number of councillors standing per ward.
- When IER commences in June 2014, all addresses would be crossed matched with DWP records, any anomalies would be investigated and verified i.e. by visiting properties etc. Members could inform electoral services if they had details of people who were not on the electoral register.

With regards to Appendix A, the Review of Polling Districts and Polling Places documents which were handed out to members at the meeting, officers highlighted that the information listed was subject to change as each recommendation was reviewed and new locations visited for suitability.

The Chair expressed his appreciation to officers who had worked hard to ensure residents in Fish Island were provided with an accessible polling station.

5. EXCLUSION OF THE PRESS AND PUBLIC

It was resolved that in accordance with the provisions of Section 100A of the Local Government Act 1972, as amended by the Local Government (Access to Information) Act 1985, the press and public be excluded from the remainder of the meeting on the grounds that the remaining agenda item contained information defined as exempt or confidential in Part 1 of Schedule 12A to the Local Government Act 1972.

REASONS FOR URGENCY

This report was not circulated with the Committee agenda and was unavailable for inspection within the timescales set out in the Authority's constitution because it was not possible to collate the necessary information prior to agenda despatch. The report is nevertheless recommended for consideration at this meeting in order to ensure that there is no delay in the implementation of the new polling district and polling place arrangements.

1. SUMMARY

- 1.1 The Council has undertaken a review of polling districts and polling places in accordance with the Representation of the People Act 1983 (as amended).
- 1.2 The review was undertaken following the confirmation by parliament of the Council size and ward boundary changes recommended by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE). The purpose of the review is to determine the polling districts and polling places to be used within each of the twenty new wards in the borough from 2014 onwards.
- 1.3 The functions of the General Purposes Committee include certain powers in relation to the holding of elections and the maintenance of the electoral register. On 17th June 2013 the Committee received a report on the proposed arrangements for the review of polling districts and polling places; and a further update on the review, including the initial proposals of the Returning Officer for consultation, was submitted on 25th September.
- 1.4 The review is now complete and this report sets out the representations received in response to the consultation and the final recommendations for the new polling arrangements.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 That the Committee note the information in the report and agree the proposed new arrangements for polling districts and polling places as attached at Appendices C and D.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The Council is required by the Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013 to undertake a polling district and polling place review at least once every five years. A relevant authority must during each compulsory review period carry out and complete
 - (a) the period of 16 months beginning with 1st October 2013, and
 - (b) the period of 16 months beginning with 1st October of every fifth year after that.
- 3.2 This does not prevent a relevant authority carrying out a review of some or all of the polling districts or polling places in its area at other times.
- 3.3 In accordance with the Electoral Administration Act 2006, reviews have taken place in 2007 and 2011, with a supplementary review in 2009. At the 2011 review, the Committee agreed that polling districts should remain unchanged pending the Electoral Review to be conducted by the LGBCE. Now that the Commission's recommendations are known, a review of polling districts and polling places has been carried out.

Definitions

3.4 Section 16 of the Electoral Administration Act 2006 introduced a number of changes in respect of the way in which the review of polling districts and polling places must be undertaken. Polling districts, polling places and polling stations are defined as follows:-

polling district - the area created by the division of a constituency, ward or division into smaller parts, within which a polling place can be determined which is convenient to electors.

polling place - the building(s) or area(s) within each polling district in which polling stations will be selected by the Returning Officer.

polling station - the actual room or building chosen by the Returning Officer, within the polling place, where the process of voting takes place at an election.

3.5 The Electoral Commission has issued guidance on the practical procedures involved in conducting a review of polling districts and polling places, including measures to ensure compliance with the provisions of the Disability Discrimination Act. In determining polling places, an authority must:

- (a) seek to ensure that all the electors in the constituency have such reasonable facilities for voting as are practicable in the circumstances; and
- (b) seek to ensure that so far as is reasonable and practicable, the polling places they are responsible for are accessible to all electors, including those who are disabled, and when considering the designation of a polling place, must have regard to the accessibility needs of disabled persons

Statutory requirements

- 3.6 Schedule A1 to the Representation of the People Act 1983 sets out the steps that authorities must follow in undertaking any review of polling districts and/or polling places. The authority must:-
 - Publish notice of the holding of the review
 - Consult the Returning Officer for every parliamentary election held in a
 constituency that is wholly or partly within its area. The Returning
 Officer must make representations which must include information as
 to the location of polling stations (both existing and proposed) within
 polling places (both existing and proposed).
 - Within thirty calendar days of their receipt, the relevant authority is required to publish the Returning Officer's representations
 - Actively seek representations from such persons as it thinks have particular expertise in relation to: access to premises; or facilities for persons who have different forms of disability
- 3.7 On completion of a review, the authority is required to give reasons for its decisions in respect of the designation of both polling places. In addition, the authority must publish:
 - all correspondence sent to a Returning Officer in connection with the review:
 - all correspondence sent to any person whom the authority thinks has particular expertise in relation to access to premises or facilities for persons who have different forms of disability;
 - all representations made by any person in connection with the review;
 - the minutes of any meetings held by the authority where details of the review have been considered;
 - details of the actual designations of polling districts and polling places agreed as a result of the review; and
 - details of where the results of the review have been published.

4. REVIEW OF POLLING DISTRICTS AND POLLING PLACES - UPDATE

4.1 General Purposes Committee on 17th June 2013 agreed the process and timetable for the review. During the first stage of the review from 8th to 26th July, the Returning Officer sought the initial views of Members and reviewed

reports from the presiding officers at recent elections.

- 4.2 In accordance with the legislation mentioned above the Returning Officer's proposals for the new polling districts, including information on the location of existing and proposed polling stations within polling places (existing or proposed) were then published for public consultation on 19th August 2013. As part of the consultation process, a Members' Seminar was held on 2nd September 2013. A copy of the consultation document setting out the RO's proposals is attached at Appendix 'A'.
- 4.3 In addition to all elected members, specific invitations to comment on the proposals were sent to the political group leaders on the Council, the local MPs and GLA Member, constituency organisations of the political parties, the Metropolitan Police Service and the Corporate Director, Education, Social Care and Wellbeing (in connection with the use of school premises)). In accordance with statute the Council also sought the views of groups representing, and/or with expertise regarding accessibility for, people with disabilities; and any elector may make representations on the designation of polling places.
- 4.4 A range of submissions were received during the consultation process and these were assessed including visits to suggested polling stations to check accessibility etc. A schedule of the representations made and the RO's comments on these is attached at Appendix B.
- 4.5 The RO's final proposals for polling districts and polling places within each of the new wards are set out in the schedule attached at Appendix C and the maps at Appendix D.
- 4.6 Detailed maps showing the new wards, each proposed polling district and polling place may also be viewed on the Council's website by clicking on the 'Elections and Voting' Quick Link on the Home Page.

5. THE ELECTORAL REGISTER

- 5.1 Where an authority makes any alterations to the polling districts within its area, the Electoral Registration Officer must amend the register of electors accordingly. The Electoral Commission recommends that alterations to polling districts be timed to coincide with the annual revision of the register of electors in order to avoid confusion both for electoral professionals and other recipients of the register.
- 5.2 A revised Register of Electors 2014 will be amended to reflect the new wards and polling districts effective for the local elections in 2014. As part of a package of measures associated with the forthcoming introduction (after the 2014 elections) of Individual Electoral Registration, the Government has amended the timing of the canvass in 2013/14, which will run from the beginning of October to 16 February 2014. The revised Electoral Register will then be published on 17th February 2014.

5.3 Councillors will continue to receive updates of the electoral register for their current wards for the remainder of the municipal year. In addition candidates and agents for the 2014 elections will be supplied with the appropriate register based on the new ward arrangements.

6. CONCURRENT REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT CHIEF EXECUTIVE (LEGAL)

- 6.1 The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is established by the Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Act 2009 and the electoral review of Tower Hamlets was conducted in accordance with that legislation and associated regulations.
- In carrying out a review of polling places, the Electoral Administration Act 2006 requires that each polling district must have sufficient and suitable designated polling places that provide 'such reasonable facilities for voting that are practicable in the circumstances' including accessibility for electors with disabilities. The Council is under a duty to promote equality for those with a disability and the recommendations of the review will be drafted with this duty in mind.
- 6.3 Other legal comments are incorporated into the body of this report.

7. COMMENTS OF THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

- 7.1 The reduction in the number of Councillors from 51 to 45 will result in a saving of approximately £61k per annum in the Members' Allowances budget with effect from 2014/15.
- 7.2 The report describes a review of polling districts and polling places in Tower Hamlets ahead of the 2014 elections. Any financial implications arising from changes to the polling districts or polling places are expected to be fully contained within existing budgets.

8. IMPLICATIONS FOR ONE TOWER HAMLETS

- 8.1 The aim of the electoral review is to secure appropriate and as far as possible equal representation for electors across all wards of the borough.
- 8.2 Disability issues have been taken fully into account in election matters particularly in the polling station review. All recommended polling places are as far as practicable located centrally within the polling district and are accessible for people with disabilities.

9. SUSTAINABLE ACTION FOR A GREENER ENVIRONMENT

9.1 Within the constraints of the suitability and availability of the accommodation, polling places are located so as to minimise the distance electors need to travel to cast their vote.

10. ANTI POVERTY IMPLICATIONS

10.1 There are no anti-poverty implications arising directly from this report.

11. RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

11.1 The polling place review exercise is concerned with managing risk at all premises used as polling places

12. IMPLICATIONS FOR CRIME AND DISORDER REDUCTION

12.1 There are no crime and disorder reduction implications arising directly from this report.

REVIEW OF POLLING DISTRICTS AND POLLING PLACES 2013

RETURNING OFFICER'S PROPOSALS: CONSULTATION DOCUMENT

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 On 26th June 2013 Tower Hamlets Council gave notice of a review of polling districts and polling places in accordance with the Representation of the People Act 1983 as amended ('The 1983 Act').
- 1.2 The review is being conducted following implementation of the recent electoral review of the borough by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE), which proposed changes to the council size and ward boundaries for local government elections. From 2014, 45 councillors will represent two single-member, eleven two-member wards and seven three-member wards across the borough. The current review will determine the polling districts and polling places to be used within each of the 20 new wards.
- 1.3 In accordance with legislation the representations of the Returning Officer on the review must be published for consultation, including information on the location of polling stations (existing or proposed) within polling places (existing or proposed).
- 1.4 This consultation document sets out the Returning Officer's proposals. Comments are invited from all interested parties and the general public by 5.00 p.m. on Friday 13th September 2013.

2. THE REVIEW - CRITERIA AND PROCESS

- 2.1 The following definitions are used in this document:-
 - Polling district the area created by the division of a constituency, ward or division into smaller parts, within which a polling place can be determined which is convenient to electors.
 - <u>Polling place</u> the building(s) or area(s) within each polling district in which polling stations will be selected by the Returning Officer.
 - Polling station the actual room or building chosen by the Returning
 Officer, within the polling place, where the process of voting takes place at
 an election.

- 2.2 The 1983 Act (section 18B (4)) sets out rules that apply to a review of polling districts and polling places. The authority must:-
 - Seek to ensure that all electors in a constituency have such reasonable facilities for voting as are practicable in the circumstances;
 - Seek to ensure that so far as is reasonable and practicable every polling place is accessible to electors who are disabled; and
 - When considering or reviewing the designation of a polling place, have regard to the accessibility needs of disabled persons.
- 2.3 The polling place for a polling district must be:-
 - In an area in the district, unless special circumstances make it desirable to designate an area wholly or partly outside the district; and
 - Small enough to indicate to electors in different parts of the district how they will be able to reach the polling station.
- 2.4 In making these proposals, every effort has been made to find suitable alternative polling places for secondary schools, portakabins and where there is uncertainty about availability for future elections. The aim is to enhance the convenience, suitability and practical electoral arrangements for electors.
- 2.5 Close attention has been paid to DDA provisions whilst conducting the review. Before determining the suitability of the proposed alternative polling places set out below, each venue will be inspected and the results recorded on a checklist, which assesses suitability, safety and compliance.
- 2.6 Regard has also been had to representations received by the ERO since the launch of the review on 26th June 2013, including from Councillor Craig Aston on behalf of the Conservative group and Councillor Marc Francis as a member for Bow East ward.

3. PROPOSALS: POLLING DISTRICTS

3.1 The Returning Officer's new polling district proposals are as follows:

- 3.2 **Bethnal Green;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts BGS2, MGT1, MGT2, and MGT3, plus a small part of polling district BGN2. There are now five new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.3 **Blackwall and Cubitt Town;** the new ward is comprised of current polling district BCT2, the majority of polling district BCT3, part of polling districts BCT1 and BCT5, plus a small part of BCT4. There are now four new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.4 **Bow East;** there are no split polling districts to consider for this ward. However, representations were made by Councillor Marc Francis to deal with the distance residents living in Fish Island need to travel to reach their current polling place allocation. As the area has been identified for future growth over the next few years, a new polling district (BE2) has been proposed for the residents of Fish Island and current polling district boundaries re-drawn to reflect the change. There are now five new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.5 **Bow West;** there are no split polling districts to consider for this ward. However, existing polling districts have been split and merged to ensure equality of property and elector numbers. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.6 **Bromley North;** the new ward is comprised of current polling district BBB1, and the majority of polling district MEE2. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.7 **Bromley South;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts BBB2 and BBB3. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.8 **Canary Wharf;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts MI1 and MI4. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.9 **Island Gardens;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts MI2, MI3, the majority of polling district BCT4 and a small part of polling district BCT3. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.10 **Lansbury;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts EIL1, EIL2, EIL3, EIL4, EIL5 and a small part of polling district LI2. There are now four new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.11 **Limehouse;** the new ward is comprised of current polling district LI4 and the

- majority of polling district SH4. There are now two new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.12 *Mile End;* the new ward is comprised of current polling districts LI1, MEE1, MEE3, MEE4, the majority of polling district LI2 and a small part of MEE2. There are now five new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.13 **Poplar;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts LI3, the majority of polling district BCT1 and a small part of BCT5. There are now two new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.14 **Shadwell;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts SH1, SH2, SH5, SH6, the majority of polling district SH3 and a small part of SH4. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.15 **Spitalfields and Banglatown;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts SPB1, SPB2, SPB3, *BGS4**, plus a small part of WE3. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward. (*NB correction of typographical error in original consultation document)
- 3.16 **St Dunstan's;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts MGT4, SDS4, the majority of polling district SDS2 and a large part of SDS1. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.17 **St Katharine's and Wapping;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts SK2, SK3 and SK4. There are now four new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.18 **St Peter's;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts BGN1, BGN3, BGN4, BGS1, BGS3 and the majority of polling district BGN2. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.19 **Stepney Green;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts SDS3, WH3, the majority of polling district SDS1 and a small part of SDS2. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.20 **Weavers;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts WE1, WE2 and the majority of polling district WE3. There are now three new polling districts proposed for this ward.
- 3.21 **Whitechapel;** the new ward is comprised of current polling districts SK1, WH1, WH2 and WH4. There are five new polling districts proposed for the ward.
 - NB: Polling district SK1 (proposed WH5P) is situated outside Bethnal Green and Bow parliamentary constituency boundary. It was therefore decided not to change the borders of this polling district. For the next UK Parliamentary election in 2015, WH5P polling district electors will vote in Poplar and Limehouse constituency.



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


