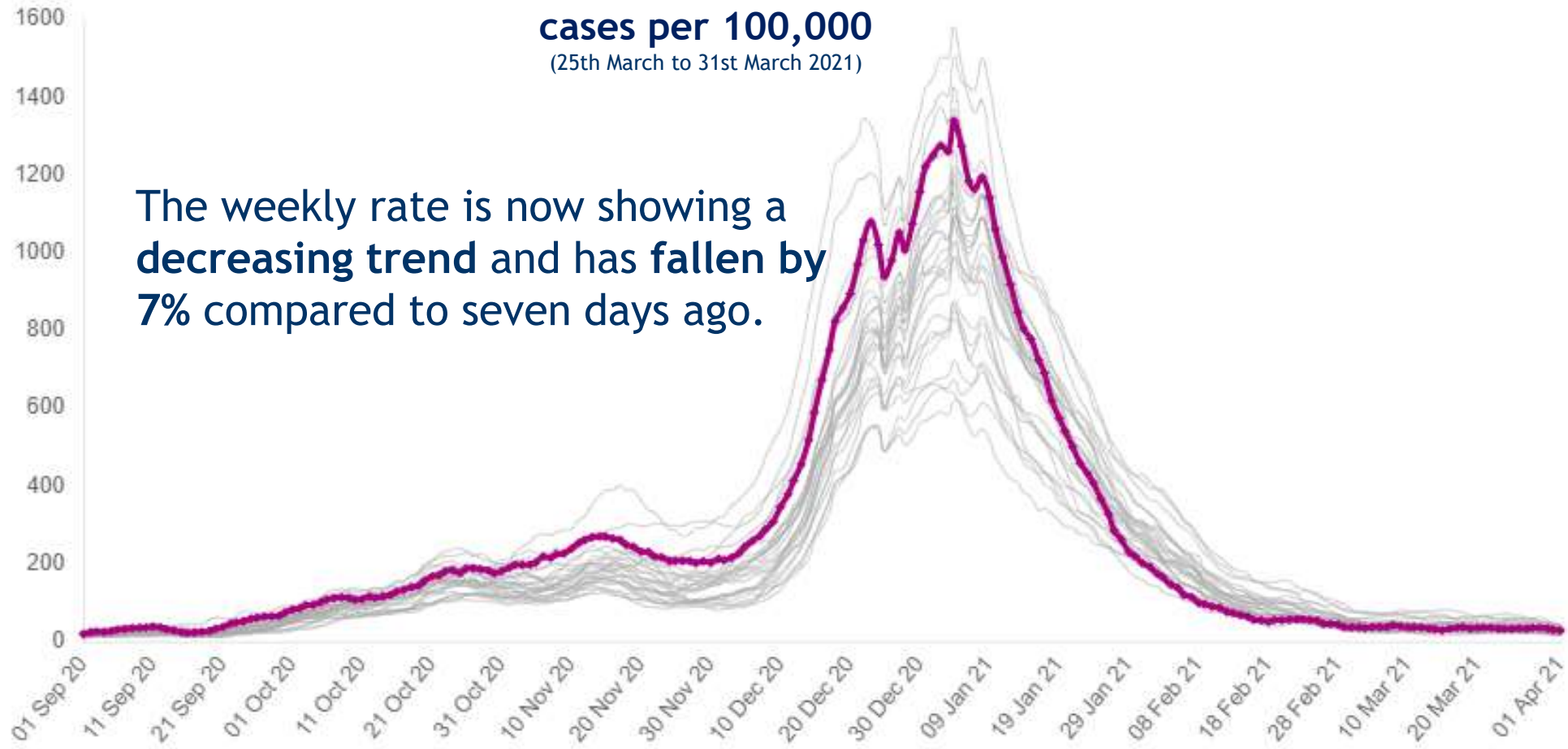


Weekly incidence rate trends

Timescales



All schools colleges & childcare re-open – incl. before- & after-school clubs

Meeting one person from another household in outdoor public spaces allowed

Close home residents allowed one visitor

Funerals (30), wakes & weddings (6)

(from 8 March)

Rule of six or two households meeting outdoors allowed inc private gardens

Outdoor sports (tennis/football/basketball courts o/d pools re-open)

Minimise travel, no holidays

Stay at home order ends

(from 29 March)

All retail re-opens

Outdoor hospitality re-opens

Outdoor settings (alcohol take-ways, beer gardens, zoos, theme parks) re-open

Indoor leisure (gyms, pools) re-opens

Libraries and Community centres re-open

Self-contained holiday accommodation re-opens

Continue to WFH if you can

30 person limit outdoors

Two households can mix indoors

Indoor entertainment and hospitality re-opens

Indoor events - up to 10,000 or 50% capacity

Why is COVID-19 vaccination important?



- We have all felt the impact of COVID-19 on all our communities in Tower Hamlets
- Vaccinating our population is vital to prevent what has happened over the past year happening again now and in the future
- If you have the vaccination
 - Your chances of getting COVID-19 are reduced by at least 80%
 - Your chance of severe illness from COVID-19 is almost zero
 - You are much less likely to pass COVID-19 to your family and friends
 - You are joining over 20 million in England who have had the vaccine
- **To get the full impact of vaccination we need to work together to get over 90% of adults vaccinated**

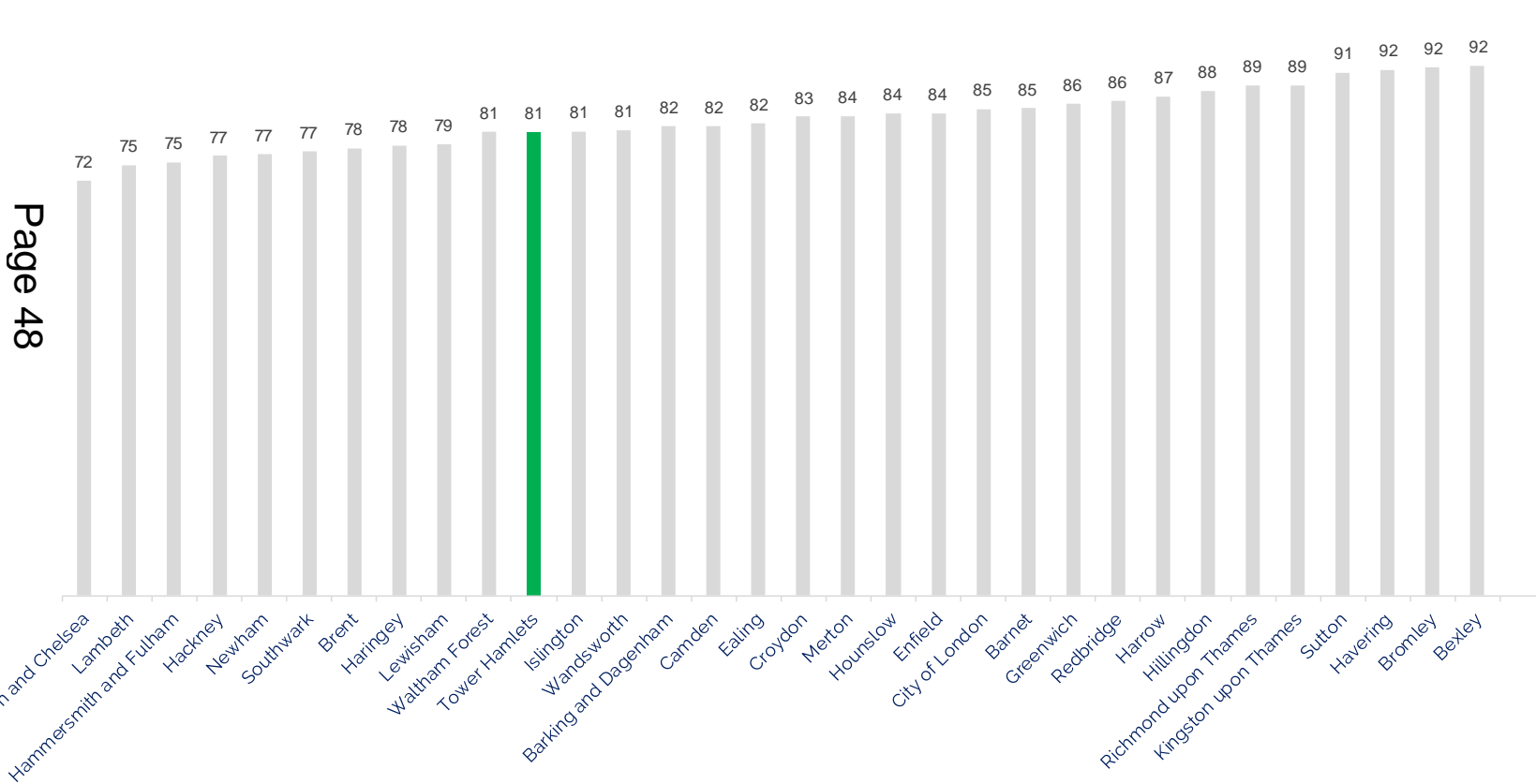


Progress

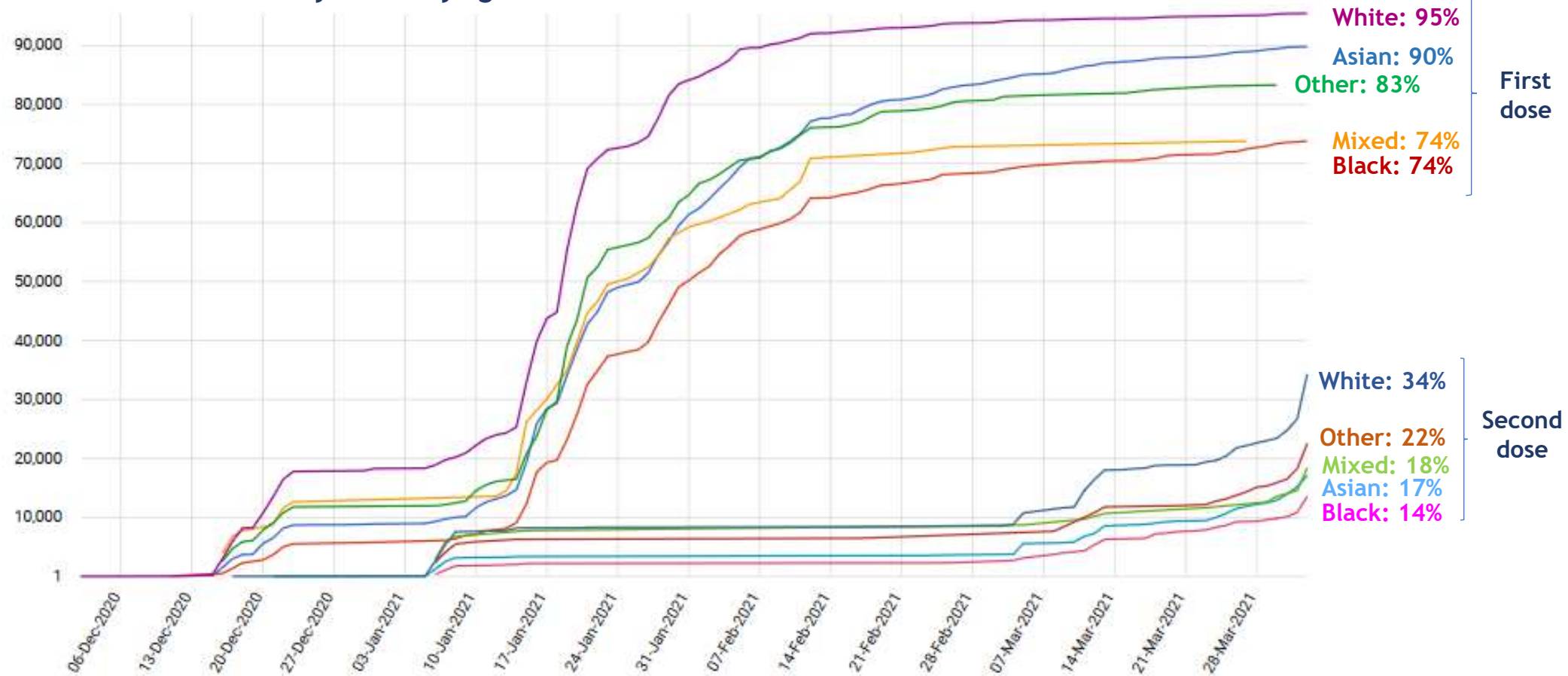
Cumulative vaccination rates by ethnicity

Cumulative rates by ethnicity aged 65 and over since December:

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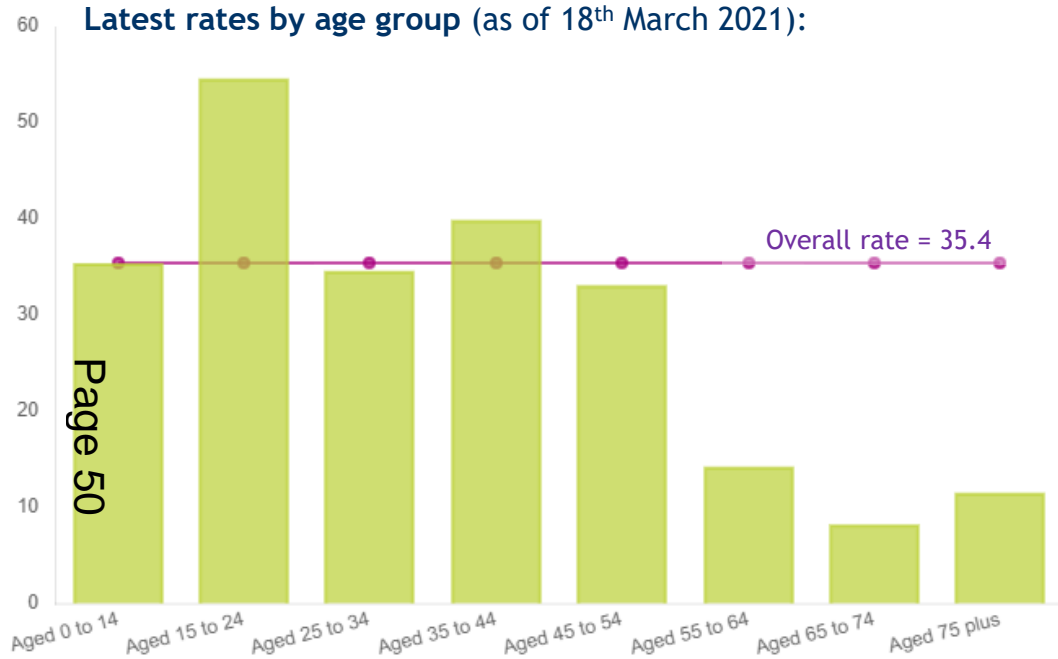


This shows the gap between groups is now narrowing for those age 65 + having their first dose of vaccine.

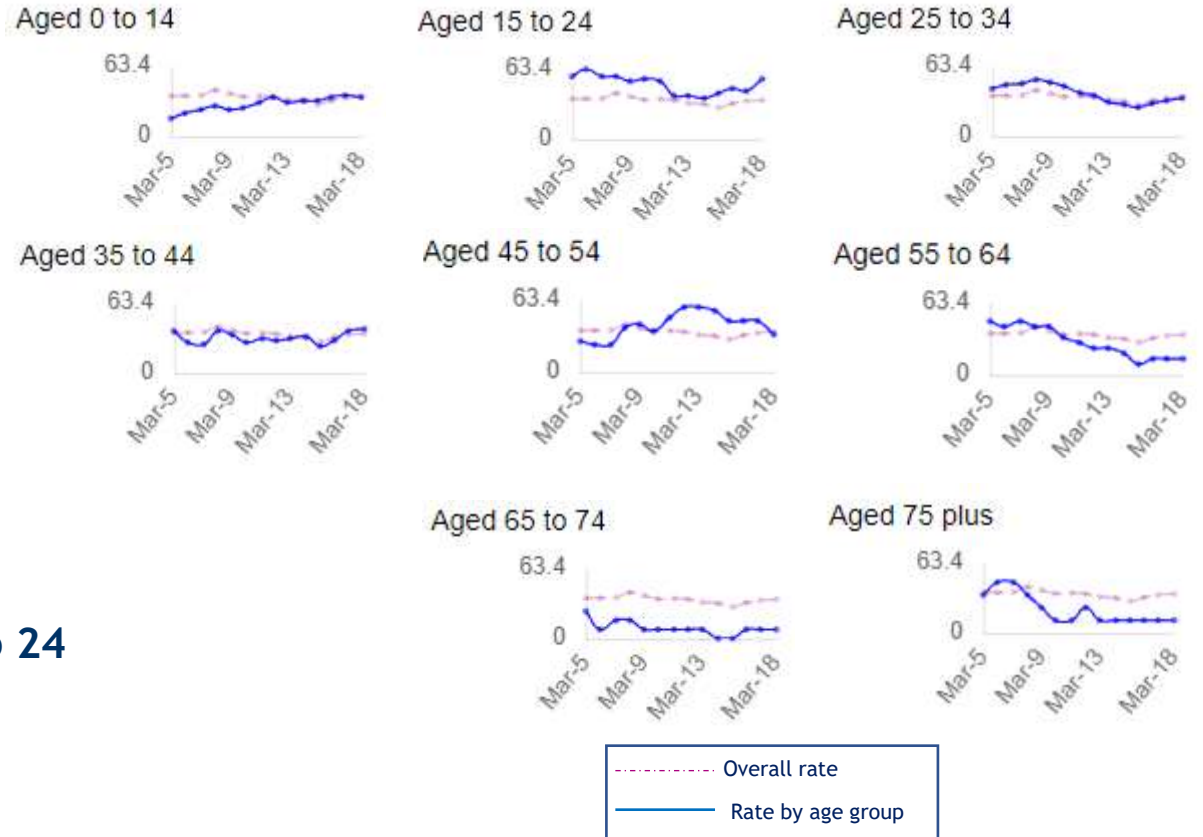

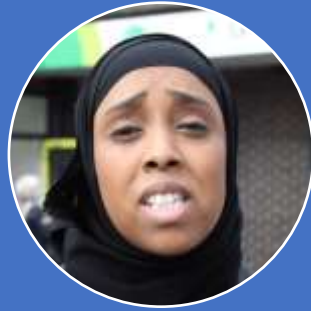


Approach to addressing uptake disparity

Q&A FOR MUSLIM COMMUNITIES
FASTING & COVID VACCINATIONS

1 Can I take the Covid-19 vaccine whilst fasting?

Taking the Covid-19 vaccines currently licensed in the UK **does not invalidate the fast**, as per the opinion of Islamic scholars. Individuals should not delay their Covid vaccinations on the account of Ramadan.

Subcutaneous, subdermal, intramuscular, interosseous, or intra-articular injections for non-nutritional purposes whilst fasting do not invalidate the fast, regardless of the injected content entering the blood circulation. These routes are not classed as entry sites that would invalidate a fast.¹ Receiving the Covid-19 vaccine as an intramuscular injection, the only route for the vaccines currently available, therefore does not invalidate the fast.

2 What if I experience intolerable side effects?

Most side effects are mild, lasting a few hours, and self-limiting. However, should an individual become more unwell after receiving the vaccine then the general principles pertaining to illness and fasting apply. These have been described in detail,²⁻⁴ and outlined in the figure below which is adapted from the BIMA Rapid Ramadan Review &
