Introduction

1. The Applicant operates a small number of specialist gin shops, operating under the name “Sacred”. They make their own gin (although not on these premises) and are a family owned business having achieved substantial critical acclaim and praise.
2. The applicant has carefully considered the issues relating to the Special Policy Area and has drafted a bespoke and comprehensive suite of conditions. Those amendments and conditions both promote the licensing objectives and address the Brick Lane Special Policy.
3. These amendments include a revision to the hours for opening and the sale of alcohol on and off the premises as follows:

Sale of Alcohol (On) Monday – Sunday: 09:00 – **20:00**

Sale of Alcohol (Off) Monday – Sunday: 09:00 – **20:30**

Opening Hours Monday – Sunday: 09:00 – **21:00**

4. In relation to the Special Policy, it can be seen on the plan submitted with the application, the premises themselves were very small with capacity for only a maximum of 40 persons on the premises at any time. This is restricted to activities of tasting, demonstrations, and presentations only.
5. The sale of alcohol off the premises is only in sealed containers and the applicant does not sell or stock any superstrength lagers or similar brands associated with street drinking or anti-social behaviour.
6. It is noted in paragraph 18.2 of the statement of licensing policy that one of the reasons for the policy is that an area has become saturated with premises making it a focal point for large groups of persons to gather, creating exceptional problems of disorder and nuisance. Because these premises are very small in capacity and the sale of alcohol on the premises is limited to pre-booked tasting events and demonstrations, the use is not associated or capable of creating any cumulative impact that the policy recognises and anticipates. Furthermore, the limited range of alcohol sold both on and off the premises does not make it an attraction for either large groups of persons or sustained heavy drinking like, for example, a public house would.
7. it will be also noted that the sale of alcohol is restricted to 8pm on the premises and 830pm for consumption off the premises, well within Framework Hours. Issues arising from cumulative impact are less likely therefore to occur in the early evening, rather than later in the evening.

8. It is further noted in paragraph 19.8 that factors the licensing authority may consider as exceptional includes small premises with a capacity of 50 persons intending to operate during framework hours. Finally, no later night refreshment or regulated entertainment is sought.
9. It will be noted that the proposed conditions include substantial operational and practice arrangements to control disturbance and adverse amenity to the area, including dealing with noise and litter. The applicant is also more than happy to join a local Pubwatch should there be one in the area. There is no Police representation.
10. Once the applicant was aware of the representations, they wrote to each and every one of them, resulting in at least 11 withdrawals as set out in the Schedule of responses received, which broadly not only withdraw the objections but support and welcome the application and what Sacred will bring to the area, rather than take away from it.
11. In summary:
 - a) These are small premises which fall within paragraph 19.8;
 - b) The licence is personal to the applicant;
 - c) The range of alcohol is very limited (unlike others in the area) and can only be sold for consumption on the premises if part of a demonstration or tasting. Off sales are limited to sealed containers;
 - d) Appropriate model conditions have been proposed which promote the licensing objectives;
 - e) The hours have been amended to well within Framework Hours; and
 - f) What started off as objections, have turned into as many as 11 messages of support.
12. For all of the above reasons, the applicant submits that the application, with the proposed conditions rebuts the presumption that this application should be refused and indeed should be granted as an exception.

Conditions

1. The sale of alcohol shall be ancillary to the retail use of the premises as a Sacred Gin Shop
2. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system as per the minimum requirements of the Tower Hamlets Police Licensing Team. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon the request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31-day period.
3. A staff member from the premises who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open. This staff member must be able to provide a Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.
4. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and be available on request to the Police or an authorised officer. It must be completed within 24 hours of any incident and will record the following:
 - a) all crimes reported to the venue;
 - b) all ejections of patrons;
 - c) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
 - d) any incidents of disorder;
 - e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons;
 - f) any faults in the CCTV system,
 - g) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
5. Alcohol shall only be sold for consumption on the premises to persons attending a pre-booked demonstration or tasting.
6. The supply and consumption of alcohol on the premises shall only be to a person seated by waiter or waitress service only.
7. All sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises shall be in sealed containers only and shall not be consumed on the premises.
8. Deliveries to the premises shall only take place between 08:00 and 20:00 Monday to Sunday.
9. Collections, including waste, shall only take place between 08:00 and 23:00 Monday to Sunday.

10. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
11. A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS Hologram.
12. A record shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The record should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The record shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer at all times whilst the premises is open.
13. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises, which gives rise to a nuisance.
14. The number of persons accommodated on the premises at any time excluding staff shall not exceed 40.





Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-

- a) at a time where there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended

1.

(1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises;

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—

(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability)

2. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

3.
 - (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.

4. The responsible person must ensure that—
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

5.
 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—
 - (a) “duty” is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) “permitted price” is the price found by applying the formula —

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$
 where —
 - (i) **P** is the permitted price
 - (ii) **D** is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

- (iii) **V** is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
 - (c) “relevant person” means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence
 - (d) “relevant person” means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
 - (e) “value added tax” means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994
3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day (“the first day”) would be different from the permitted price on the next day (“the second day”) as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day

Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, such individuals must be licensed with the Security Industry Authority.

This does not apply to premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001, (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or in respect of premises in relation to- any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of Schedule 2 (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of Schedule 2 (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act) unless the Licence specifically states otherwise.

Security activity means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of Schedule 2 of the Private Security Industry Act 2001 of that schedule applies, and

Paragraph 8(5) of Schedule 2 (interpreting of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of Schedule 2 of the Private Security Industry Act 2001

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

1. The sale of alcohol will be ancillary to those people playing or waiting to play shuffleboard. Alcohol will only be sold to those who hold a valid ticket to play shuffleboard
2. Experienced bar staff will maintain vigilance in alcohol units per customer
3. One Management Level staff member to be present at all times that the venue is open
4. SIA security present at times venue is open to public after 6pm
5. SIA security throughout the venue in pre-designated locations with industry standard equipment - protective clothing and radios
6. The level of SIA staff on site will vary according to the number of customers but will be a maximum of 2
7. Security will involve police immediately if any illegal activity occurs
8. Staff will be well trained in asking customers to use premises in an orderly and respectful manner. Anyone not adhering to this will be asked to leave the premises in a controlled and orderly manner by SIA security
9. Security and key staff shall be on radios for communication
10. Clear notices on entry and exits warning of potential criminal activity, such as theft, that may target customers shall be displayed
11. A clear and legible notice will be placed outside the premises indicating the normal hours under the terms of the premises licence during which licensable activities are permitted
12. Staff will be training in and there will be implementation of underage ID checks. Staff will be well trained about requirements for persons' identification and age establishment. Training records for staff will be logged.
13. Health & Safety officer sign off on all activity

14. Event management plan and event fire escape plan will be in place
15. A first aider on site at all times the premises is open to the public
16. No drinks allowed outside the venue perimeter and will be monitored by security
17. Noise reduction measures to address the public nuisance objective including decibel readings taken regularly and a limit on the sound with volume block
18. Prominent, clear and legible notices will be displayed at the exit requesting the public to leave the premises and the area quietly as well as security on exit to reiterate and manage noise proactively
19. Customers will be restricted from congregating in the street outside the premises and access of customers will be strictly maintained to opening hours
20. The movement of bins and rubbish outside the premises will be restricted to 08:00 – 20:00 hours. This will help to reduce the levels of noise produced by the premises. Cleaning staff will operate within hours of licence
21. Attendance levels will be kept to manageable levels and will be proactively escorted from the venue in stages to ensure minimum noise on egress
22. The noise and vibration from amplified music will be limited so it is not audible at any residential premises.
23. No noise or vibration shall emit from the venue that causes public nuisance
24. No Sound system shall be located outside
25. The outside area will be closed for general use after 21:00 hours. Smokers in the outside space will be limited to 5 smokers after 21:00 hours
26. A “Challenge 25” sign will be positioned at the bar. This will encourage anyone who is over 18 but looks under 25 to carry acceptable ID (a card bearing the PASS hologram, a photographic driving license or a passport) if they wish to buy alcohol.
27. A Log Book will be kept upon the premises at all times with staff trained in its use, it will be regularly checked and staff informed of any changes to it. The book will record all refusals of the sale of alcohol, all disorder and crimes that occur either in the premises or involve the premises’ customers

or any other incident of note. The log book will be available for inspection by authorised persons under the Licensing Act 2003

28. Full exclusion for anyone under 18 will be in place after 6pm and zones will be created to separate as best as possible under 18s and those consuming alcohol.

29. The CCTV system shall incorporate a recording facility and any recordings shall be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum of 31 days.

- a. A system shall be in place to maintain the quality of the recorded image and a complete audit trail maintained.
- b. The system will comply with other essential legislation, and all signs as required will be clearly displayed.
- c. The system will be maintained and fully operational throughout the hours that the premises are open for any licensable activity.
- d. There must also be someone on the premises, who can download the images and present them on request by a police officer or other responsible authority.


