Where Members have a personal interest in any business of the authority as described in paragraph 4 of the Council's Code of Conduct (contained in part 5 of the Council's Constitution) then s/he must disclose this personal interest as in accordance with paragraph 5 of the Code. Members must disclose the existence and nature of the interest at the start of the meeting and certainly no later than the commencement of the item or where the interest becomes apparent.

You have a **personal interest** in any business of your authority where it relates to or is likely to affect:

- (a) An interest that you must register
- (b) An interest that is not on the register, but where the well-being or financial position of you, members of your family, or people with whom you have a close association, is likely to be affected by the business of your authority more than it would affect the majority of inhabitants of the ward affected by the decision.

Where a personal interest is declared a Member may stay and take part in the debate and decision on that item.

What constitutes a prejudicial interest? - Please refer to paragraph 6 of the adopted Code of Conduct.

Your personal interest will also be a <u>prejudicial interest</u> in a matter if (a), (b) <u>and</u> either (c) or (d) below apply:-

- (a) A member of the public, who knows the relevant facts, would reasonably think that your personal interests are so significant that it is likely to prejudice your judgment of the public interests; AND
- (b) The matter does not fall within one of the exempt categories of decision listed in paragraph 6.2 of the Code; AND EITHER
- (c) The matter affects your financial position or the financial interest of a body with which you are associated; or
- (d) The matter relates to the determination of a licensing or regulatory application

The key points to remember if you have a prejudicial interest in a matter being discussed at a meeting:-

- i. You must declare that you have a prejudicial interest, and the nature of that interest, as soon as that interest becomes apparent to you; and
- ii. You must leave the room for the duration of consideration and decision on the item and not seek to influence the debate or decision unless (iv) below applies; and

- iii. You must not seek to <u>improperly influence</u> a decision in which you have a prejudicial interest.
- iv. If Members of the public are allowed to speak or make representations at the meeting, give evidence or answer questions about the matter, by statutory right or otherwise (e.g. planning or licensing committees), you can declare your prejudicial interest but make representations. However, you must immediately leave the room once you have finished your representations and answered questions (if any). You cannot remain in the meeting or in the public gallery during the debate or decision on the matter.

1. **SUMMARY**

This report contains:

- Appeals from the African Women's Welfare Association received requesting a review of the Grants Panel decisions in relation to its Adults, Health and Being 2008/09 mainstream grants awards.
- Officers' assessments and recommendations on the appeal that has been submitted against the recommendations of the Grants Panel of 25 March 2008 which looked at the mainstream grant allocations for 2008/09.

2. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

2.1 Grants Appeals Panel is recommended to:-

> Approve the recommendations set out in section four of this report in respect of the appeal made against the 2008/09 mainstream grant decisions made by the Grants Panel on 25 March 2008.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 Cabinet is required to receive and consider appeals requesting a review of the Council's Grants Panel's decisions as part of the Council's agreed Mainstream Grants Review procedure.
- 3.2 The Mainstream Grants Review Procedure is as follows:
 - The right to have an initial grants recommendation reviewed applies
 where the Council's Grants Panel has proposed to withdraw funding or
 significantly reduce a grant to a voluntary/community organisation which
 received an on-going revenue grant (for staffing and/or running costs) in
 the previous financial year.
 - 'Significant' reduction in a grant applies where an organisation received 50% or more of its annual income from the source of funding and we propose to reduce the grant by more than 10% or where an organisation receives less than 50% of its annual income fro the source of funding and we propose to reduce the grant by 25% or more.
 - An applicant organisation must submit substantial new information not previously seen by the grants panel that has a significant and direct bearing on the recommendation.
 - The review will be the final stage in the grant decision-making process, and the decision of the Cabinet will be final.
- 3.3 Officers informed the organisation in writing of the decision of the Grants Panel 25 March 2008. Eligible organisations were given until 1 May 2008 to submit an appeal. This report informs Cabinet of the appeals received against the Adults, Health and Well-being Mainstream Grant budget.
- 3.4 If Cabinet upholds the Grants Panel's decisions, organisations that received a revenue grant in the previous financial year, may apply for winding down costs where the reduced or withdrawn funding source contributed more than 50% of the organisation's total income. If this arises, details will be submitted in the report to the Grants Panel which sets out requests for emergency funding.
- 3.5 This appeal will need to be considered against the contingency sums indicated in the table below. As a result of the Grants Panel meeting of 25 March 2008, the current funding position is as follows:

4. REVIEW OF THE COUNCIL'S GRANTS PANEL

4.1 Community Development Service - Sickle Cell and Community Development Service - Thalassaemia

- 4.1.1 The Grants Panel, at its meeting on 25 March 2008, decided not to make an award due to officer's concerns about issues relating to the organisation's financial management, its current financial situation and the ability of its management committee to manage the organisation.
- 4.1.2 The organisation has submitted an updated copy of its audited accounts, with the previous errors in it amended. The new document was signed and backdated to 24 December 2007. In addition to this a covering letter stating that new management committee members had been elected was submitted and a document identifying the roles of the trustees.
- 4.1.3 The amended accounts continue to show a reserves position of just £5,690 carried forward into 2008/09 and there has been no new information submitted outlining how the organisation will reduce its expenditure by the £35,000 it needs to remain financially viable, or how it will increase its funding.
- 4.1.4 The Primary Care Trust has informed the organisation that it will discontinue funding as of 30 September 2008 due to similar concerns about the management of the organisation and its financial viability. Contract management and substantial monitoring of this service was undertaken jointly between Officers and the Primary Care Trust. The Primary Care Trust is exploring how it will meet the needs of people with Sickle Cell and Thalassaemia. Primary Care Trust funding amounts to £36,800 (55% of the organisations overall funding of £66,490).
- 4.1.5 No new information has been submitted that significantly affects the original recommendation. The 2007/08 award represents 38% of the organisation's overall funding of £ 66,490.

4.2 Officers Recommendation

4.2.1 Officers recommend that the decision taken on 25 March 2008 not to fund this organisation is upheld.

5. COMMENTS OF THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

- 5.1 The Adult Health & Wellbeing budget for grants to voluntary organisations £433,300. There is currently £19,181 of this total which is uncommitted.
- 5.2 The report recommends that the decision taken on 25th March 2008 to not fund the African Women's Welfare Association is upheld, for reasons given in the report.
- 5.3 If the funding is awarded, £2,411 will remain uncommitted.

6. <u>CONCURRENT REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT CHIEF EXECUTIVE</u> (LEGAL SERVICES)

- 6.1 Pursuant to section 65 Health Services and Public Health Act 1968 a Local Authority may give grant assistance to a voluntary organisation whose activities consist of or include provision of a service similar to one which the authority may itself secure.
- 6.2 In exercising its discretion the panel must consider all relevant factors including the appended assessment forms. In determining whether to provide grant aid the panel should also consider amongst other things the Council's priorities and value for money of the proposed work to be undertaken.

7. EQUALITY IMPLICATIONS

7.1 The procedure has been devised to ensure that organisation's appeals for any additional funding are heard in a fair and equitable manner.
Organisations providing specific services for women, people from ethnic minority communities, and people who are financially excluded have been considered in this report.

8. ANTI-POVERTY IMPLICATIONS

8.1 As a grant-giving body, the Council supports local voluntary organisations and service providers which are working to alleviate poverty among local people, building upon their capacity to develop local communities and increase their participation decision-making in Tower Hamlets. In addition, Mainstream grant aid generates significant additional income in unclaimed benefits for low income households.

9. SUSTAINABLE ACTION FOR A GREENER ENVIRONMENT

9.1 There are no specific implications arising from this report.

10. RISK ASSESSMENT IMPLICATIONS

- 10.1 A number of different risks arise from any funding of external organisations. The key risks are:
 - The funding will not be fully utilised i.e. allocations remain unspent; or outcomes are not maximised;
 - The services being delivered do not continue to reflect local need;
 - The funding will be used for purposes that have not been agreed e.g. in the case of fraud
 - The organisations may not be able to secure the additional funding necessary to deliver the agreed activities;
 - The organisation may not in the event have the capacity to sustain the outputs and outcomes required;
- 10.2 A range of mechanisms are in place to address the above potential risks.

 These are:
 - Application of the formal eligibility criteria and terms and conditions of grant aid;
 - Regular monitoring and support as required to ensure that funded organisations maximise the use of their grant and ensure they are introduced to a range of funding and capacity building opportunities;
 - Ensuring that financial cost proposals are based on secured funding or by making the award conditional on the organisation submitting evidence of secured funding before payments are made;
 - Working with organisations to ensure that outputs and targets are realistic and appropriate for the amount of secured funding

11. EFFICIENCY IMPLICATIONS

11.1 Applications are assessed against our funding priorities and core outcomes. Applications need to demonstrate how the grant will meet our funding priorities and link to the Community Plan. The process of inviting applications is coordinated by the Third Sector team providing a single application process across all directorates. Grant applications received need to show how the Council's grants will help the organisation to improve the quality of life for residents. Grant awards enable the voluntary sector services to significantly increase its reach, and its impact on the local third sector service provision in the Borough.

Financial comment:

The organisation submitted the audited accounts for 2005/06 in November 2007 and the accounts for 2006/07 in January 2008. Both sets of accounts were late.

In addition, the application also has incorrect information and does not correspond to either current funding levels or its audited accounts or the budget it has produced for Council Officers. The organisation's expenditure has exceeded its income in 2005/06 and 2007/06 and the organisation organisation's expenditure will exceed income by £28,036, meaning that the organisation will not be able to pay its creditors. Neither set of audited accounts make reference to a reservces policy.
