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Agenda Item 2 DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS - NOTE FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE

This note is guidance only. Members should consult the Council's Code of Conduct for further details. Note: Only Members can decide if they have an interest therefore they must make their own decision. If in doubt as to the nature of an interest it is advisable to seek advice **prior** to attending at a meeting.

Declaration of interests for Members

Where Members have a personal interest in any business of the authority as described in paragraph 4 of the Council's Code of Conduct (contained in part 5 of the Council's Constitution) then s/he must disclose this personal interest as in accordance with paragraph 5 of the Code. Members must disclose the existence and nature of the interest at the start of the meeting and certainly no later than the commencement of the item or where the interest becomes apparent.

You have a **personal interest** in any business of your authority where it relates to or is likely to affect:

- (a) An interest that you must **register**
- (b) An interest that is not on the register, but where the well-being or financial position of you, members of your family, or people with whom you have a close association, is likely to be affected by the business of your authority more than it would affect the majority of inhabitants of the ward affected by the decision.

Where a personal interest is declared a Member may stay and take part in the debate and decision on that item.

What constitutes a prejudicial interest? - Please refer to paragraph 6 of the adopted Code of Conduct.

Your personal interest will also be a <u>prejudicial interest</u> in a matter if (a), (b) <u>and</u> either (c) or (d) below apply:-

- (a) A member of the public, who knows the relevant facts, would reasonably think that your personal interests are so significant that it is likely to prejudice your judgment of the public interests; AND
- (b) The matter does not fall within one of the exempt categories of decision listed in paragraph 6.2 of the Code; AND EITHER
- (c) The matter affects your financial position or the financial interest of a body with which you are associated; or
- (d) The matter relates to the determination of a licensing or regulatory application

The key points to remember if you have a prejudicial interest in a matter being discussed at a meeting:-

- i. You must declare that you have a prejudicial interest, and the nature of that interest, as soon as that interest becomes apparent to you; and
- ii. You must leave the room for the duration of consideration and decision on the item and not seek to influence the debate or decision unless (iv) below applies; and

- iii. You must not seek to <u>improperly influence</u> a decision in which you have a prejudicial interest.
- iv. If Members of the public are allowed to speak or make representations at the meeting, give evidence or answer questions about the matter, by statutory right or otherwise (e.g. planning or licensing committees), you can declare your prejudicial interest but make representations. However, you must immediately leave the room once you have finished your representations and answered questions (if any). You cannot remain in the meeting or in the public gallery during the debate or decision on the matter.

SUMMARY

- 1. The Charity of Thomas Dickinson was set up in 1852 for the benefit of the poor in the Metropolitan Borough of Stepney, preference being given to members of the Church of England. The trustees of the charity are three ex-officio trustees (the Rector of St Dunstan and All Saints Stepney, the Rector of St George-in-the-East with St Paul and the Vicar of Christchurch with All Saints Spitalfields); plus three trustees nominated by the Council.
- 2. In recent years the work of the charity has fallen into neglect and the last recorded meeting of the trustees was on 24 May 2002. Because of this, and fact that there are other charities which provide similar benefit in the same area, the trustees have resolved to begin the process of winding up the charity and transferring its assets to other charities. The Clerk to the Trustees has written to the Council to ask whether the Council has any objection to this proposal. The Council has not appointed any trustees to the charity in the current municipal year and for a number of years prior to 2002 attendance by the Council-appointed trustees was sporadic.
- **3.** The legal context and implications of the proposal to wind up the charity are set out in the comments of the Assistant Chief Executive (Legal Services) overleaf.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- **4.** That the Committee indicate on behalf of the Council whether they have any objection to the proposed winding-up of the Charity of Thomas Dickinson as set out in the report.
- **5.** That, if the Committee does not object to the proposal, the Clerk to the Trustees be informed of this and be asked to report back in due course to the Assistant Chief Executive (Legal Services) on the outcome of the winding-up and the transfer of the charity's assets.

BACKGROUND

- 5. The Charity of Thomas Dickinson was set up in 1852 for the benefit of the poor in the Metropolitan Borough of Stepney, preference being given to members of the Church of England. Under the Charity Commissioners' Scheme dated 24 November 1959 and amended 12 August 1982 the trustees consist of 'six competent persons':- three ex-officio trustees (the Rector of St Dunstan and All Saints Stepney, the Rector of St George-in-the-East with St Paul and the Vicar of Christchurch with All Saints Spitalfields); plus three trustees nominated by the London Borough of Tower Hamlets.
- 6. The Council previously administered the charity and until 1989 provided a clerk. After that date the appointment by the Council of trustees, and attendance by those trustees, became sporadic. There are no current appointments of Council representatives to the charity. After 1989 the Charity Commission was asked to confirm that the charity could operate with a quorum of just the ex-officio trustees and for some years the charity continued its work on this basis but following changes of clergy in the area its work fell into neglect.
- 7. An attempt was made in 2001 to revive the work of the charity but the last recorded meeting of the trustees was on 24 May 2002. Because of the lack of activity, and in view of the fact that there are other charities which provide similar benefits in the same area, it has been suggested that the charity be wound up and its assets transferred to other charities. A meeting was therefore called by the existing trustees on 13 January 2009 to make a formal decision to wind up the charity and to put into place the actions necessary to achieve this. Mr John Kitchen was appointed to act as Clerk to the Trustees to organise the winding up.
- 8. Mr Kitchen has now written to the Council to ask whether the authority has any objection to the proposal to wind it up. The proposal agreed at the recent meeting of the trustees is that the assets of the charity (estimated currently at just over £14,000) would be divided equally between the three parishes for them to allocate to other charities working within the local area for the same purpose.
- **9.** The Committee is asked to indicate on behalf of the Council whether the proposal is acceptable to the authority.

CONCURRENT REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT CHIEF EXECUTIVE (LEGAL)

10. The Charity of Thomas Dickinson has not been active for a number of years and the Council has not currently appointed trustees to the Charity. A Clerk to the Trustees has been appointed with a view to winding up the charity. In doing so the Clerk will be obliged to liaise with the Charity Commissioners to ensure that the procedures for winding up and transferring the charity's assets are in accordance with the Commissioners' guidance and the purpose set out in the agreed scheme for the charity itself.

COMMENTS OF THE CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

11. There are no implications for the Council's own budgets arising from this report. The assets of the Charity of Thomas Dickinson would, if the winding up of the charity is agreed, be divided equally between the three parishes in the area for allocation to other charities providing similar support.

12. There are no immediate implications for One Tower Hamlets arising from this report. The funds held by the Charity of Thomas Dickinson will be passed to other charities which will continue to provide similar services within the area.
