

## Brexit Scrutiny Review for 2018/19 Draft Scoping Document

Name of Scrutiny Work	Impact of Brexit on Tower Hamlets
Context and	Brexit Challenge Session
background	As part of his work programme for 2017/18, the Scrutiny Lead for Governance, Councillor Ayas Miah undertook a Scrutiny Challenge Session focused on the potential impact of Brexit on the Council. There were a total of 10 recommendations that were agreed at the Challenge Session.
	The challenge session offered the opportunity to begin exploratory discussions on the Council's resilience planning and to recommend key priorities for mitigation planning. Due to uncertainty around Brexit negotiation, limited time, resources and scope, the Challenge Session was not able to discuss the impact of Brexit on Tower Hamlets as a place, such as our economic stability and community cohesion.
	<ul> <li>Therefore one of the key recommendations was for the 2018/19 Overview &amp; Scrutiny Committee to continue the Brexit Scrutiny work into the new municipal year and:</li> <li>Provide officers with sufficient information to allow them to organise a full Brexit Scrutiny Review and agree focus of further evidence sessions;</li> <li>Support and equip the new Overview and Scrutiny Committee to obtain further assessment of the progress of Brexit and consider its implications for the Council, Partners and our wider community;</li> <li>Complete the Brexit Scrutiny work on time and produce report with clear recommendations for the Council and Partners to consider.</li> </ul>
Main aims and objectives the Brexit Scrutiny Review	<ul> <li>Obtain detailed assessment and better understanding of the progress of Brexit and its implications for the borough;</li> <li>Successfully engage all stakeholders in discussions and consultation on Brexit;</li> <li>Review local risk management plans and available impact reports based on the different Brexit scenarios and take into account the equalities impact assessment;</li> <li>Consider how statutory partners, local businesses, residents and community groups can work together to minimise impact on the borough;</li> <li>Explore potential benefits and opportunities for the borough post-Brexit and consider the development of new policies and programmes for education and skills and development of the local economy.</li> </ul>
