R1	That the Council and all Registered Social Landlords (RSLs) in Tower Hamlets provide Cabinet with an annual report detailing how they are meeting the six strands of the Respect agenda.	The 16 RSLs who have signed up to the standards will be able to provide the information. The Council will work with the rest of the RSLs to gather information from them.  This work will also provide information for the Partnership Strategic Assessment of Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships (CDRP). The purpose of the strategic assessment is to provide knowledge and understanding of community safety problems in the borough. This assessment will offer information on the Council and RLSs approach to tackling crime and disorder matters, linked to the old Respect agenda.		The initial scope identified that the local Authority and Tower Hamlets Homes manage their ASB data on one database, 6 others manage their operations on a different, jointly purchased database, whilst the remaining RSLs operate independently.  We have experienced problems pulling the information together.

Throughout the period that a GBZ runs the police endeavour to ensure that the SNTs are fully engaged with it. However, other policing issues, leave, sickness, training, and other abstractions will pull officers away from working on the operation. They do not have data on other teams such as the Territorial Support Group TSG. Although they ask for assistance they cannot detail the length of time that the teams stay in the borough.
