


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

Good Afternoon Licensing,

Having reviewed the premises license application for Tea Garden 138 Whitechapel Road, London, E1 1JE I have to consider the impact of the licensing objectives, particular for Environmental Protection the prevention of public nuisance and the prevention of noise generated from within the premises or outside to be causing disturbance to people in the vicinity, and the fact that the licensable hours applied for are well beyond the Council's framework hours.

It must be noted that the Council's framework hours (i.e., when premises are open) are:

- Monday to Thursday 0600 hours to 2330 hours; and
- Friday & Saturday 0600 hours to midnight
- Sunday 0600 hours to 2230 hours.

The applicant is proposing licensable activity: late night refreshment:

- Monday to Wednesday until 02:00 hours (extension of two and a half hours on framework hours)
- Thursday until 02:00 hours (extension of two and a half hours on framework hours)
- Friday & Saturday until 02:00 hours (extension of two hours on framework hours)
- Sunday until 02:00 hours (extension of three hours on framework hours with late night refreshment from 23:00 to 02:00).

I emailed the applicant on the 15thJuly 2024, with the noise conditions I wished to apply to the licence, to promote the licensing objective for the prevention of public nuisance, but I have not received a response (*please see email attached*)

There is insufficient information in the operating schedule of the licence application to show how the applicant will promote the licensing objective for the prevention of public nuisance when considering access and egress from the premises, patrons in high spirits, patrons in groups loitering outside the premises, at the late hour sought in the application.

Noise Sensitive premises: residential premises in close proximity including three residential properties adjacent at Medinan House, 136 Whitechapel Road and immediately above the venue, at 138 Whitechapel Road.

In my view the application, as it stands fails, to comply with the objective of the Licensing Act 2003 relating to "public nuisance" for the following reasons:-

- Noise breakout from the venue affecting neighbouring residents.
- Access & egress to and from the venue including patrons outside the premises to smoke, whilst the premises is in operation.
- Hours of operation

CONCLUSION

Environmental Protection **does not** support the application for Tea Garden 138 Whitechapel Road, London, E1 1JE for the following reasons:

- (1) There is great likelihood of disturbance to residential premises from the impact of additional footfall at the late hours sought.
- (2) The applicant has not provided sufficient information to show how they will promote the licensing objective for the prevention of public nuisance, and noise conditions we wish to add have not been agreed (see attached)

If the committee are minded to grant this application, I would ask that the following conditions be considered:

- 1. Notices shall be prominently displayed at all exits requesting patrons to respect the needs of local residents and businesses and leave the area quietly.
- 2. No idling of vehicles, being either patron or delivery vehicles outside the premise whilst premise is in operation.
- 3. There shall be no loitering of patrons outside the premises, and once patrons have received their order they shall disperse immediately from the vicinity of the premises.
- 4. No noise generated on the premises, or by its associated plant or equipment, shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.

I am writing in my capacity as Licensing Authority in relation to the premises licence application for the above address and wish to make representation on the grounds.

- Prevention of public nuisance
- Prevention of crime and disorder

The above premises has been subject to enforcement action by this Licensing Authority since 1st June 2024. The premises has had a significant history of operating daily past 11 PM without a late night refreshment licence and selling illicit cigarette to customers.

On 1st June 2024 part of nighttime operation (Op Dymock) between 2340 to 2345 hours test purchase completed for late night refreshment (LNR) under the Licencing Act 2003 at the aforesaid premises and bought 1 cup of tea, 1 coffee and 1 hot Somosa for £5.50. While Mr. Sekander Hossain (manager) remained under caution and the licensing officer was asking questions, a couple of customers arrived in and asked for single cigarette. The licensing officer then enquired as to whether the establishment sell single cigarette which was denied. Since the officer suspected that illegal cigarettes were being sold on the premises, licensing officer sought permission to search with management's consent. Upon searching, officer found 8 * 200 = 1600 cigarettes as well as 3 loose

packets, each containing 20 cigarettes (3 * 20) = 60 cigarettes. At the time advise and warning given by record of contact sheet under licensing act 2003.

Two weeks later 15th June 00:33 hours part of Op Dymock premises was witness open trading and customer having hot food and hot drinks without premises licence. At 00:40 hours officers entered and spoke with Mr. Sekander Hossain (manager) and explained not to trading without premises licence late night refreshment between 11 PM to 5 AM any day

Part of the nighttime visit by the licensing officer premises witnessed open trading two weeks later on 15 June at 00:33, with customers consuming hot food and beverages without a premises licence. Officers approached at 00:40 and reminded Mr. Sekander Hossain, the manager, that it is illegal to operate without a premises licence late-night refreshments on any day between 11 PM and 5 AM and obtain details from driving licence.

Officers observed Mr. Sekander Hossain, the manager, serving hot tea and coffee to customers through windows on June 29, 2024, at 00:15 hours and July 27,2024 at 00:25 hours. Mr. Hossain was warned both times for customers congregating near the store, lingering there, making noise, having cigarette's, blocking the public pavement, and grouping in this location, both time warning was given to Mr Hossain.

The councils farmwork hours for premises carrying out licensable activities, are there to protect the public from nuisance behaviour at sensitive hours. There are a number of café food / drink establishment within this area trading late into the evening and I believe granting a licence for late night refreshment to this establishment will increase and attract more people to loiter in this area. The residents are already suffering from ASB, noise & crime and disorder and the granting of a premises licence will further enable such behaviour.

The licensing authority sent the business a warning letter. Trading Standard is currently pursuing legal action for operating without a licence to provide late-night refreshments and for selling illegal cigarettes.

Mr Hossain (manager) and Mr Fahim Uddin (business owner) has shown no regard to the Licensing Act 2003 and to the officers of the Council by ignoring warnings and advise given to him. Therefore, this Responsible Authority does not feel confident in that he will uphold the licensing objectives and ask that the application be rejected.

In my objection, I've included pictures of **exhibits A** and B. Exhibit A documents a test purchase made on June 1, 2024; exhibit B illustrates the trading of hot food and beverages on June 15 and June 29, 2024; exhibit C details Google's advertising opening hours on August 23. Attached There's also a record of contact and a warning letter to the premises and to the limited company.



While Mr. Sekander Hossain (manager) remained under caution and the licensing officer was asking questions, a couple of customers arrived in and asked for single cigarette.

The licensing officer then enquired as to whether the establishment sell single cigarette which was denied. Since the officer suspected that illegal cigarettes were being sold on the premises, licensing officer sought permission to search with management's consent. Upon searching, officer found 8 * 200 = 1600 cigarettes as well as 3 loose packets, each containing 20 cigarettes (3 * 20) = 60 cigarettes. At the time advise and warning given by record of contact sheet under licensing act 2003.

I am writing as a representative of Tower Hamlets Trading Standards, considered a Responsible Authority within the Licensing Act 2003 regime.

This letter is to raise an objection against the application made by Mr Fahim Uddin of AF Global BD Ltd for a new premises licence at 138 Whitechapel Road, London, E1 1JE. These representations are submitted on the grounds of the **prevention of crime and disorder** and the **protection of children from harm**.

This Trading Standards Authority is aware that on Friday 1st June 2024 Council officer colleagues found multiple packs of suspected illegal cigarettes at that premises. The cigarettes were taken by the Council officers and passed to the Trading Standards team the following week for further investigation.

The total quantity found was 1642 cigarettes from three different brands and types, these being Benson and Hedges Special Filter, Platinum Seven Blue and Platinum Seven Gold. This suggests that they were not for personal use and it is suspected that people working at that premises were selling them to members of the public.

Furthermore, not all the packs were sealed. Three of the packs had been opened and contained fewer than 20 cigarettes in them. It is suspected that single cigarettes, or multiples of, were being sold at that premises, which is illegal to do so in the UK.

The packets for the cigarettes were in the brands' usual style and not in the type and colour of plain packaging as required under current UK law.

Some laws applicable to cigarettes include:

- The Tobacco and Related Products Regulations 2016 these Regulations determine the display of health warnings on tobacco products packaging, among other requirements for tobacco products. The packets of cigarettes found at that premises did not display the applicable combined health warnings (text warning and picture) that are required under these Regulations, which would constitute a criminal offence for their supply.
- The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015 these Regulations determine the colour and design of tobacco products packaging in the UK. The packets of cigarettes found were not in the only colour that is permitted under these Regulations, this being Pantone 448 C, nor did the brand names on the packaging meet the set conditions contained within the Regulations.
- The Children and Young Persons (Protection from Tobacco) Act 1991 created an offence for any person carrying on a retail business to sell cigarettes to any other person other than in their original packaging. This is the law that prohibits the sale of single cigarettes and was introduced as it was more likely to for children to buy singles, rather than whole packs.

The suspected supply of illegal cigarettes remains an ongoing criminal investigation by this Trading Standards Authority.

The supply of illegal cigarettes undermines the Public Health agenda of aiding current smokers from quitting, preventing people from taking up smoking and to create a smokefree generation. In addition, the supply of illegal cigarettes impacts on duty raised by HM Treasury, which in-part could affect funding for smoking cessation services.

This Responsible Authority is not confident that the applicant will be able, intentionally or not, to uphold the Licensing Objectives, therefore we submit an objection to the granting of the licence.

Dear Sir/Madam,

We have received the application for longer trading hours for the Tea Garden premises at 138 Whitechapel Road. Unfortunately the reference printed on the letter is unclear as only the lower half has been printed.

There are a number of serious issues with this application:

The Tea Garden has been trading for a few years from the premises at 138 Whitechapel Road. It is a small shop with very limited/ no capacity for clients to sit inside the premises. Most of their clients stand outside the premises. Smoking and drinking is carried on outside and litter is strewn around the surrounding premises. The cafe has no procedure to clear up the mess made by the disposable cups and litter left by clients. Our gates regularly have half filled coffee cups perched precariously on any flat surface clients can find to leave the cups on. Our gate posts, walls and metal furniture are marked with red paan spat by their clients. We have to employ staff to clean our car park entrance. We are unable to remove the paan stains from our metal furniture and walls.

The inability to contain clients inside the premises to consume goods sold by the business is a major problem as it causes a tremendous nuisance for surrounding owners/occupiers and pedestrians passing by. Residential occupiers will be disturbed late at night all 7 days, they will be unable to sleep and recover after a hard days work. The council is trying very hard to clean up Whitechapel but this application encourages squalor and sets back the tremendous efforts being made by the Council to clean up Tower Hamlets.

This application needs to be firmly rejected.

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Section 182 Advice by the Home Office Updated on August 2023

Relevant, vexatious and frivolous representations

- 9.4 A representation is "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives. For example, a representation from a local businessperson about the commercial damage caused by competition from new licensed premises would not be relevant. On the other hand, a representation by a businessperson that nuisance caused by new premises would deter customers from entering the local area, and the steps proposed by the applicant to prevent that nuisance were inadequate, would be relevant. In other words, representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives. For representations in relation to variations to be relevant, they should be confined to the subject matter of the variation. There is no requirement for a responsible authority or other person to produce a recorded history of problems at premises to support their representations, and in fact this would not be possible for new premises.
- 9.5 It is for the licensing authority to determine whether a representation (other than a representation from responsible authority) is frivolous or vexatious on the basis of what might ordinarily be considered to be vexatious or frivolous. A representation may be considered to be vexatious if it appears to be intended to cause aggravation or annoyance, whether to a competitor or other person, without reasonable cause or justification. Vexatious circumstances may arise because of disputes between rival businesses and local knowledge will therefore be invaluable in considering such matters. Licensing authorities can consider the main effect of the representation, and whether any inconvenience or expense caused by it could reasonably be considered to be proportionate.
- 9.6 Frivolous representations would be essentially categorised by a lack of seriousness. Frivolous representations would concern issues which, at most, are minor and in relation to which no remedial steps would be warranted or proportionate.
- 9.7 Any person who is aggrieved by a rejection of their representations on either of these grounds may lodge a complaint through the local authority's corporate complaints procedure. A person may also challenge the authority's decision by way of judicial review.
- 9.8 Licensing authorities should not take decisions about whether representations are frivolous, vexatious or relevant to the licensing objectives on the basis of any political judgement. This may be difficult for councillors who receive complaints from residents within their own wards.

If consideration is not to be delegated, contrary to the recommendation in this Guidance, an assessment should be prepared by officials for consideration by the sub- committee before any decision is taken that necessitates a hearing. Any councillor who considers that their own interests are such that they are unable to consider the matter independently should disqualify themselves.

- 9.9 It is recommended that, in borderline cases, the benefit of the doubt about any aspect of a representation should be given to the person making that representation. The subsequent hearing would then provide an opportunity for the person or body making the representation to amplify and clarify it.
- 9.10 Licensing authorities should consider providing advice on their websites about how any person can make representations to them.

Licensing Policy Section 11

Prevention of Public Nuisance

- 11.1 Licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning, can cause a range of nuisances impacting on people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises.
- 11.2 Like many London boroughs, Tower Hamlets has may areas of the borough where businesses and residents are "cheek by jowl" with each other. Thus, the correct balance needs to be adopted ensuring residents are not unduly disturbed by licensed premises, whilst ensuring this does not stifle growth in the licence trade.
- 11.3 Though all licensed premises must promote the licensing objectives, and thus actively try to prevent public nuisance being caused by their licensable activities, there are some factors that this Licensing Authority would expect to applicants to consider and where appropriate address in their operating schedule. These are:
 - a) Music/performances

Measures to reduce impact of noise on residents

b) Queue management

Measure to prevent obstruct access to properties, pavements. Measure to reduce the impact of people noise on residents

- c) Ingress and Egress Measure to prevent people noise during ingress and egress
- d) Use of outside areas (see 11.7 below)
- e) Deliveries, particularly pick-ups by vehicles Measures to prevent noise/fumes from engines, drivers (including smoking),
- f) Bottle disposal
 Done at reasonable time to prevent impact on residents e.g. between 8am and 8pm
- g) Litter

Measures to prevent littering around the venue from patrons

- 11.4 The Licensing Authority appreciates that it would not be necessary or appropriate for all applications to have measures to prevent the above issues. Nevertheless, we will take a strong view on applications for licences that are in close proximity to residential premises, and whose indented use has a higher likelihood of causing public nuisance. This also includes those applications in areas covered by a Cumulative Impact Assessment (CIA). Especially where the applications falls outside the scope of any exceptions to such CIAs.
- 11.5 The Licensing Authority, where its discretion is engaged, will consider, where appropriate, attaching conditions to licences and permissions to prevent the

problems identified listed above, or any other conditions it considered appropriate and proportionate to promote the licensing condition of prevention of public nuisance.

- 11.6 **Street Furniture** placing of street furniture, which includes advertising boards, on the highway can cause a public nuisance by way of obstruction or encourage consumption of alcohol on an unlicensed area. The Licensing Authority expects applicants to have ensured that they fully comply with the Councils rules relating to authorisation of obstructions on the highway, and that the required authorisations are obtained prior to submitting a licence application. Where proportionate and appropriate, and its discretion is engaged, the Licensing Authority will impose conditions in relation to street furniture, including on private land.
- 11.7 **Fly Posting** The Council has experienced problems with "fly posting" in relation to venues that offer entertainment. Fly posting is the unauthorised posting of posters / advertisements etc. Where it considers it proportionate and appropriate, and its discretion is engaged, the Licensing Authority will attach conditions relating to the control of fly posting to ensure that venues clearly prohibit all fly posting in their contract terms with others and they effectively enforce this control.
- 11.8 **Beer Gardens and outside areas** since the ending of the restrictions imposed during the Coronavirus pandemic, we have seen an increase the use of outside areas. This has also been encouraged by Government under the Business and Planning Act 2020. We want to strike the right balance between allowing businesses to thrive whilst still protecting residents of the borough being unduly disturbed by the night time economy. Hence, we would encourage applicants address this concern in their operating schedule by detailing what mitigating measures they intend adopt to reduce any disturbance the use of the outside area is likely to have on neighbouring residents. Such measures could include:
 - limiting the amount of patrons permitted in the outside area, and/or,
 - restricting the use of areas after a certain time,
 - ceasing its use after a certain time.

Where disturbance of residents from outside areas is likely, and where its discretion is engaged, this Licensing Authority may add conditions limiting the numbers of person permitted to use any outside areas, and/or seek to cease the use of any outside areas after 21:00 hours.

11.9 **Party Boats** – An increasing number of complaints have been received in London Boroughs that boarder the River Thames in relation to "Party Boats", which use the River. In respect of this we would encourage applicants for Party Boats to consider adopting the "Boat" conditions, listed in our Model Conditions in Appendix 3, where appropriate to promote the Licensing Objective of Prevention of Public Nuisance. Furthermore, where disturbance of residence from these party boats is likely, and where its discretion is engaged, this Licensing Authority may add one or more of the boat conditions from our Model Conditions.

Guidance Issued by the Home Office under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003

Updated December 2022

Public nuisance

- 2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- 2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 2.17 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 16). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.
- 2.18 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.

- 2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.
- 2.20 Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises which is considered appropriate to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues.
- 2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in anti-social behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

Anti-Social Behaviour from Patrons Leaving the Premises

General Advice

Members need to bear in mind that once patrons have left a premises they are no longer under direct control. Members will need to be satisfied that there is a link between the way the premises is operating and the behaviour that is complained of. An example of this would be that irresponsible drinking is being encouraged. Before deciding that any particular licensing conditions are proportionate, Members will also need to be satisfied that other legislation is not a more effective route. For example, if the problem is drinking in the street it may be that the Council should designate the area as a place where alcohol cannot be consumed in public.

Members may also wish to consider whether the hours of opening relate to any problems of anti-social behaviour.

If Members believe that there is a substantial problem of anti-social behaviour and it cannot be proportionately addressed by licensing conditions they should refuse the application.

Licensing Policy

The policy recognises that other legislation or measures may be more appropriate but also states that licensing laws are "a key aspect of such control and will always be part of an overall approach to the management of the evening and night time economy" (see Section 5.14 and 5.15 of the Licensing Policy).

The Licensing Authority expects the applicant to have addressed all crime and disorder issues relating to the premises in their operating schedule and to have sought appropriate advice. (See Sections 9.2 of the Licensing Policy)

The Licensing Authority will consider attaching conditions to deter crime and disorder and may be draw from the Model Conditions in **Appendix 3 of the Licensing Policy**. In particular Members may wish to consider (this list is not exhaustive):

- Bottle Bans
- Plastic containers
- CCTV (outside the premises)
- Restrictions on open containers for "off sales"
- Proof of Age scheme
- Crime prevention notices
- Drinks promotions-aimed at stopping irresponsible promotions
- Signage

Cumulative Impact

There is a process by which the Licensing Authority can determine that an area is saturated following representations. However, the process for this involves wide consultation and cannot come from representations about a particular application. (See Section 20 of the Licensing Policy).

Police Powers

The Licensing Act 2003, Part 8 gives a senior police officer the power to close a premises for up to 24 hours where the officer believes there is, or is likely to be disorder on or in the vicinity and closure is necessary in the interests of public.

Guidance Issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003

The key role of the Police is acknowledged (2.1).

Conditions attached to licences cannot seek to manage the behaviour of customers once they are beyond the direct management of the licence holder, but can relate to the immediate vicinity of the premises as they seek entry or leave (1.16).

Conditions are best targeted on deterrence and preventing crime and disorder (2.3) CCTV inside & out, communication, police liaison, no glasses are all relevant

There is also guidance issued around public nuisance (2.15 - 2.21).

Licence conditions should not duplicate other legislation (1.16).

Necessary and appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods and may address disturbance as customers enter or leave the premises but it is essential that conditions are focused on measures within the direct control of the licence holder (2.18/2.21).

Licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are away from the licensed premises and, therefore, beyond the direct control of the individual, club or business holding the licence, certificate or authorisation concerned (14.13).

Other Legislation

Crime and Disorder Act 1998

The Council has a duty under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder.

The Act also introduced a wide range of measures designed to address anti- social behaviour committed by adults and young people. These include:

• Anti-Social Behaviour Orders

- Child Curfew Schemes

- Truancy
 Parenting Orders
 Reparation Orders
 Tackling Racism

Licensing Policy Relating to Hours of Trading

All applications have to be considered on their own merits.

The Council has however adopted a set of framework hours as follows:

- Monday to Thursday, from 06:00 hrs to 23:30 hrs
- Friday and Saturday, from 06:00 hrs to 00:00 hrs (midnight)
- Sunday, from 06:00 hrs to 22:30 hrs

(see 16.8 of the Licensing Policy)

In considering the applicability of frame work hours to any particular application regard should be had to the following

- Location
- Proposed hours of regulated activities, and the proposed hours the premises are open to the public
- The adequacy of the applicant's proposals to deal with issues of crime and disorder and public nuisance
- Previous history
- Access to public transport
- Proximity to other licensed premises, and their hours

(See 16.9 of the Licensing Policy)

Subject to any representations to the contrary in individual cases the following premises are not generally considered to contribute to late night anti-social behaviour and will therefore generally have greater freedom

- Theatres
- Cinemas
- Premises with club premises certificates

Planning

An application for a Premises Licence can be made in respect of a premises even where the premises does not have relevant Planning Permission. That application has to be considered and Members can only refuse the application where the application itself does not promote one of more of the Licensing Objectives. Members cannot refuse just because there is no planning permission. Where a Premises Licence is granted and which exceeds what is allowed by the Planning Permission and that Premises then operates in breach of planning then the operator would be liable to enforcement by Planning.
