


Dear Sirs,

I fully support the application by many local residents for a review of the current Premises Licence held by "Public Life", the underground night-club at 82a Commercial Street, Spitalfields, London E1 6LY

I believe most strongly that their current licence should be cancelled on the grounds of:

- many years experience of the terms of their licence being flouted
- the use of drugs by their customers
- the noise, nuisance and ASB caused by their customers.

For many, many years "Public Life" has caused misery to local residents by failing to control their customers, ignoring the permitted hours and generally allowing their customers to cause noise and nuisance at unsocial hours in the neighbourhood of Christchurch Spitalfields, and the junction of Fournier Street and Commercial Street. After many years of nuisance and failing to operate within their licence conditions, "Public Life" should be closed down on the grounds of having clearly demonstrated that their owners/management are unfit to operate a night-club.

Spitalfields is an area suffering from noise, drugs, ASB and crime, and is already over-supplied with off-licences and night-clubs operating at unsocial hours. The police are over-stretched in coping with behaviour in Spitalfields, and both as a local resident and as a member of the local Police Ward Panel I believe that closing down "Public Life" would be a significant improvement to Spitalfields in terms of lessening aggravation to the residents and easing (slightly) the overload on the police.

In particular this premises is very close to Christchurch Spitalfields, and not far from the local Mosque and it is totally unsuitable to have such antisocial behaviour in the vicinity of these establishments.

For all the above reasons I believe most strongly that the current licence held by "Public Life" should be cancelled.

PS: Whilst I realise suggesting that "Public Life" should be taken back into ownership by LBTH and re-instated as a public convenience is outside the scope of a review of their licence, the fact remains that Spitalfields is desperately in need of public conveniences and clearly

these premises would be one potential solution to the problem of urination in Spitalfields.
