





Where is it happening Geographic Hotspots






- The hotspot map is reflective of A demand for the period relating to November 2019 up to October 20

ASB trends – COVID impact





ASB demand has continued to increase - 53% in the last year

Some lockdown months saw the biggest increases, likely due to COVID19 related ASB reports

ASB reports are likely to have increased also due to the lockdown - "pent up" demand

Community Safety Partnership Resident's Feedback 2020



8% think ASB is a serious problem

49% reported ASB as a "very significant issue". This is in comparison to 42% of respondents reporting crime is a serious problem.

8% think noise nuisance is a big problem


Almost half of respondents felt noise nuisance was a big problem. The majority of respondents reported that it wasn't "noisy neighbours" that were the issue, but rather groups of youths congregating late into the night, often driving cars dangerously and revving engines loudly. Speeding or abandoned cars (66%) were reported as being a problem.

3% think Drugs & Drug dealing are a serious problem

Drug use and drug dealing (88% of respondents), Nitrous Oxide (79%), were overwhelmingly identified as the main issues people had in terms of ASB., Groups of youths congregating late into the night, partying on the street and making noise was also referenced by large cohort of respondents, as was 'dog fouling' and 'Fly tipping'.

Tackling Perpetrators of ASB



- The 4 most prolific perpetrators of ASB known to various council services and agencies had a total of 304 incidents between them – substance misuse is a common factor.
- "Support /Enforcement Model" for those engaged in substance misuse particularly including those engaged in using drugs.
- Diversionary programmes for women involved in prostitution and "kerb crawling".
- Council staff trained and able to use a broad range of enforcement powers to solve problems and deal with perpetrators.



What are we doing – The Partnership Response



eveloping the Community Safety Partnership Plan – ASB priority evised Governance - Police, Council and Tower Hamlets Homes e-designed council offer (Safer Neighbourhood Operations) – localities ased teams to partner the ward panels,
