Tower Hamlets Net Zero Carbon Partnership Action Plan

What are the aims / objectives of the policy, proposal or activity?

The Tower Hamlets Partnership Climate Change Action Plan, developed by the Tower Hamlets Climate Emergency Taskforce, is a 3-5 year boroughwide Net Zero Carbon Partnership Action Plan (live document). The Taskforce was established by the Tower Hamlets Partnership Executive Group (PEG) to develop the partnership action plan on behalf of them. The members comprised 10 representatives from the PEG member organisations and five other community organisations.

The action plan identifies 10 actions to tackle the climate emergency under the following seven themes:

- 1. Collaboration and Leadership
- 2. Data
- 3. Education, Communication & Engagement
- 4. Green Jobs
- 5. Demonstration of the possible
- 6. Procurement
- 7. Greening, growing and biodiversity.

Objectives of the actions are:

1. Mapping and connecting existing initiatives across the partners, and communicating



these actions

2. New initiatives and actions to speed up to achieve Net Zero Carbon requirements.

PEG aims to launch the action plan in November coinciding with COP26 to gain momentum and maximise the communication opportunity. The council has committed to become a Net Zero carbon borough by 2050 or earlier and the PEG has also agreed to aim to achieve this aspiration together with the council.
