Executive Summary

This report sets out what the Community Safety Service in Tower Hamlets Council has delivered over the past 12 months to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour (ASB) in the borough. This activity is set against the challenging backdrop the Covid-19 pandemic has presented and highlights how the service has risen to these challenges while maintaining operational delivery to residents.

3 <u>DETAILS OF THE REPORT</u>

- 3.1 This report provides an overview of our activity to tackle crime and ASB over the last 12 months. In summary, we have:
 - <u>Tackled neighbourhood crime and ASB</u>: This includes: the rollout of our neighbourhood management model across the borough; the implementation of our new ASB & enforcement team the 'Neighbourhood Enforcement and Treatment' team; the introduction of a new Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) to address Nitrous Oxide related ASB; and how the council's CCTV has been utilised to support the police to target criminals while delivering a £3m capital upgrade of our CCTV infrastructure.
 - <u>Tackling hate crime, community tensions, and extremism:</u> This includes: a significant number of 'training, outreach, and engagement' activities delivered to different groups to tackle hate crime; Prevent training and projects to protect those at risk from radical/extremist exploitation; and protective security initiatives to implement wider protective security measures around key attractions and places in the borough.
 - Reduced reoffending and tackled the drivers of crime: This includes: operations to tackle the supply of drugs; drug and alcohol dependency treatment services to tackle substance misuse; a new targeted intervention 'Addiction, Disruption, Diversion, Enforcement & Recovery' programme to carry out a whole system wide approach to addressing drug misuse and drug related crime; the development of a serious organised crime profile to better target serious organised crime; and the rollout of a refreshed integrated offender management framework.
 - Reducing Violence and safeguarding those at risk of violence and exploitation: This includes: a new Community Safety Partnership Plan that prioritises violence reduction through safeguarding those at risk of violence and vulnerability; a refreshed Violence and Vulnerability Reduction action plan; supporting the development of a VCS consortium to deliver place-based interventions to tackle violence on the Isle of Dogs; and a new Violence Vulnerability and Exploitation strategy. We also have a large portfolio of of work aimed at addressing violence against women and girls such as a new contract with Solace Women's Aid, the continuation of the

- Sanctuary scheme, and the development of a new women's safety programme.
- <u>Planned and responded to civil emergencies in the borough:</u> This includes: enhancing our out of hours capabilities and resilience; responding to 30 civil emergencies in the borough, delivering civil contingency training and exercising; and overseeing all of the council's business continuity plans.
