The October Half-term pilot was extremely successful. Over 300 children, many of whom were new to swimming, benefited from the innovative intensive swimming programme. GLL is currently finalising the February Half-term and Easter holiday programmes.		
However, with York Hall due to re-open in April, it is anticipated that demand / need for these sessions will decrease. Future sessions will be demand led.		
Tiller Leisure Centre received a significant £500k upgrade with an enhanced swimming pool hall, centre redecoration and upgraded gym. The centre reopened on 3 <sup>rd</sup> January 2022.		
Reopening Tiller leisure centre results in three swimming pools being available for use, significantly increasing the borough's swimming capacity. This will relieve the pressure on Mile End Park & Poplar Leisure Centres by relocating Isle of Dogs bookings back to Tiller Leisure Centre.		
The capital improvement works to York Hall Leisure Centre is ongoing and on track for re-opening in April 2022.		

At present there is one school that requires additional support accessing swimming lessons. This school and others that have identified children who have missed the in-school swimming lessons will be prioritised for intensive holiday swimming lessons and free transport support to open swimming pools to facilitate continued school swimming.


GLL is currently working with schools to support access to swimming lessons by creating extra capacity by reprogramming the existing swimming pools and delivering intensive swimming sessions in addition to the standard 'wet programme'

Tiller Leisure Centre has re-opened and it is anticipated that York Hall Leisure Centre will re-open in April 2022. This will significantly increase swimming capacity in the borough.		
To date the majority of school swimming lessons have been accommodated in the borough's swimming pools or at pools in neighbouring boroughs, with one school currently unable to access swimming lessons.		
Further funding opportunities for free travel for these schools will be explored for the new financial year and ongoing.

A Lido is one of the options that is being considered but no decision on lido provision in the borough has been made at this point.	Michael Coleman	
It should be noted that a lido is not an equivalent leisure centre space for swimming provision. Lidos particularly appeal to adult fitness swimmers and do not meet the wider needs of school and family swimming, especially as a learning to swim environment.		
At a time of increasing utility costs, lido provision is likely to be prohibitively expensive but will be considered alongside other options, in terms of cost and community benefit		

# Recommendation 7

GLL and council communications to assist with wider reach to parents, dispelling myths swimming in the winter season will cause colds and better visibility of consultations
