am a Tower Hamlets resident, living in the same postcode as this venue, as well as being a regular visitor to nightlife establishments in the area.

As both a local resident and a participant in the local nightlife, I am shocked to hear that events are being banned at local venues such as E1 on account of archaic and nonsensical rules around 'nudity/semi-nudity - rules that neither help to improve conditions for local residents; nor make venues safer for attendees.

People go to these venues to be able to express themselves, wearing clathes and outfits that are no different from what most people would wear on a hot summer's day. These venues and their attendees are part of what makes Tower Hamlets such a vibrant and lively place to live, enriching the culture and diversity of the borough.

When Klub Verboten is hosted at E1, I feel safe because they have strict, enforced door policies, meaning that any potentially harmful individuals are refused entrance; and because they have a well-trained safeguarding team in place, who are always on hand to ensure all our safety throughout the night.

In fact, I would say that Klub Verboten events are the most safe and friendly environments I have experienced of any nightlife events or venues in London. And female friends of mine who also attend have explicitly stated the same.

Banning events on the grounds of nudity/semi-nudity therefore neither helps to make the nightlife community safer, nor local residents safer. Instead, it is detrimental to all.

I therefore hope that you will remove this backward condition from E1's events license, and help to restore the borough as a vibrant nightife hub for all.

I do not feel same level of comfort in any other venue. The events have several signs in every room reminding of the club rules \& safety measures which are displayed on several large LED TVs. The event organizers have strict door policies and they also ensure that these are maintained inside the venue. Attendees, most of whom have gone through membership vetting, are committed to maintaining the rules and report any suspicious activity to the staff. The venues always provide dressing rooms where attendees may change attire to ensure safe travel to/from the venue.

Whenever I have left a Klub Verboten event at E1, I have felt safe, happy and loved by a beautiful community of individuals who feel atrongly about inclusion and personal autonomy. As a regular visitor to the Tower Hamlet's night scene and in particular events at E1 and other venues, with events ranging from artistic performances to drag and club nights such as those hosted by Klub Verboten, I am deeply concerned about the thoughtlessness with which this ban is being implemented by the Tower Hamlets council.

The point which concerns me most about the ban seems to be in the incongruity of the language being implemented. Seeing that nudity in a general sense is not illegal in public in the UK, and that context is the most important consideration when taking this into consideration, I am troubled by myself and others in the community having our rights violated in this way.

My experiences in night clubs in a general sense as a cis-presenting woman has been dubious at best. The amount of harassment and fear of retaliation from innebrated men at 'regular' clubs has been often scary to the point of terrifying. The lack of accountability and monitoring in these spaces leaves women and more vulnerable communities such as my queer friends unable to enjoy these spaces. I have never experienced this at Klub Verboten, Crossbreed, Torture Garden or any other fetish/themed party where monitoring and club culture has a no-tolerance policy towards behaviour which is in any way threatening, inappropriate or otherwise non-consensual. This seems incongruous to anyone unfamiliar with these events, but it has definitely been my experience.

Additionally, I would add that from a policy perspective, there is no data to suggest that my taste in fashion has any bearing on the four licensing objectives, nor should it be the concern of Tower Hamlets.

I cannot tolerate that the borough would dare to remove my right to wear what I want. As you can imagine, revealing clothing is very dangerous for a woman to wear in most places. However in E1 I always feel safe and have never had any horrible or perverted or threatening interactions with ANYONE there. This is because in safe spaces, where this kind of fashion/clothing is the norm people understand it as a fashion-art form. I feel under attack by a dated and archaic rule.

Within the licensing agreement of E1 is included a clause that is archaic in nature and unapplicable to the nature of Klub Verboten and similar events. The clause states that no nudity or 'semi-nudity' is permitted in the venue, however, this is unenforceable and also acts to discriminate against those who seek safe spaces that relate to sexual identity and is discriminatory in nature towards those who identify as LGBTQ+ and/or consenting adults. It was originally intended to prevent unlicensed stripping in and around the area; this service was often provided by licensed strip clubs to paying punters. However, Klub Verboten and other events and venues around the area doesn't provide this to their guests, and instead create a safe environment for consenting adults to do so safely.

There is no evidence whatsoever that fetish events perpetuate violence or disorderly conduct. On the contrary, licensed clubs -that are unregulated and non-sexual in nature -- have historically endured many more hardships in creating a safe and regulated space. Often, they are riddled with drugs, violence, and disorderly conduct. This is something that Klub Verboten doesn't tolerate, simply because of the precarious nature of its events.

Over the years Klub Verboten has built a dedicated community that is passionate about the integrity and the safety of the event, the venue, and of each other within the community. There are rigid and strict guidelines for each member to follow to ensure their position as a member within the club. I am writing in support of E1's application to have the nudity / semi-nudity condition of their licence removed.
I am a regular visitor to events on the night scene at venues across London, and am concerned that this condition represents an attack on the self-expression of citizens, imposing highly discriminatory gender-based sanctions.

The condition appears to be unenforceable and prejudicial against citizens' sense of fashion, which clearly has no relevance to the four licensing objectives and is, frankly, simply none of Tower Hamlets' concern.

In short, I am unable to come up with any satisfactory justification for this discriminatory, censorious and unenforceable condition, which stands out as an embarrassment to Tower Hamlets and a barrier to the well-being of its minority groups. I trust that you will see to its removal.

KV's enforcement of strict door policies and door vetting is the first barrier of many that KV attempts to keep sexist, racist and simply ill meaning people out of the space. These policies are well executed. Door refusals at Klub verboten events at E1 is not uncommon, as Klub Verboten is a members club with strict vetting procedures, with a trained safeguarding team present at every room in the venue to ensure our all safety through the night.

There is already a lack of space for our community for safe exchange. Please reconsider on the plan on closing down one. I believe everyone will benefit from such an inclusive, diverse and loving community.

I am a Tower Hamlets resident and live not far from the venue. I am not a very active member of the "kink" community but despite this have been a member of KV for a number of years. I treat KV nights as I would any other night out...I am writing to strongly note the importance of such club events. They are truly one of the most inclusive, safe and well organised experiences I have had in London as a 35 yr old female...in terms of how people interact and the environment created (in term of intoxication and everything that can come with that).
I think I am also writing to recognise the importance of such places for marginalized parts of the community that should be supported.

I don't agree, or perhaps understand, the point on not allowing the club night due to nudity - when how I would dress for the night is no different from many other events I have been to elsewhere in London/TH. I also don't agree it is for the council to dictate this. I find that whoever chooses to go to the events, buys a ticket and attends so very consciously and understands the type of event they are going to. In the same way you decide whether to go to a strip club (ie Whites up the road), to listen to folk music or place of worship...you have, as an adult, decided to attend. I think it is important for Tower Hamlets to respect all communities fairly and equally. In my experience of living here for the past 5yrs, I have found TH to be a multi national, multi cultural community and would hope this is extended to all parts of our community. I also genuinely think the E1 club an appropriate location for such events. To consider otherwise would be a very interesting decision that I think would be difficult for the council to genuinely justify.

4. The safeguarding team and how they ensure our all safety through the night: I have been to other events in London parties in Colour factory, The Yard, Tobacco Dock and after being harassed by cis males and complaining about it to the security, I decided not to go back again as the Security did not do anything to support other women or me.
5. The number of safeguarding staff present at Klub Verboten events: This is the USB, and they are caring people and do this job with passion. I always feel incredibly safe.
6. What a little actual crime there is compared to vanilla high street club nights: I never experienced any lissues or harassment, nor did my friends; I have been going to Klub Verboten for years. This is the only event I attend in London plus Unfold, which is very queer; the rest of the London kink parties are a waste of time and money, and \(100 \%\) I'd get harassed.
7. The lack of space for our community for safe exchange: Klub Verboten provides quality; there are no other events in London to even compare it with. I have been to other kink events like Torture Garden and Crossbreed, and some men did not let me be to express myself; they had to say/

I am writing in support of E1's application to have the nudity / semi-nudity condition of their licence removed.

I have lived in Tower Hamlets ever since I moved to London four years ago. One thing that I really like about Tower Hamlets 〈including my neighbourhood of Spitalfields) is the sense of local community that it has given me.

My first night out in London was at a night club in Shoreditch. It was a formative experience, specifically because I got harassed by other patrons, who were touchy, loud and drunken, and quite frankly rowdy and unpleasant to be around. I had lost my friends and felt unsafe and uncomfortable, but I also didn't feel like anyone from the establishment would do anything to help me.

Compare this to my experiences at the club nights at E1 that I have been to, which have been at the completely opposite end of the spectrum for me, and some of the best, safest experiences that I have had in London. I am of course also referencing specifically the club nights that Klub Verboten hosts at E1. At a Klub Verboten night hosted at E1, I am always aware of where the monitors are, and that they are making sure everyone feels safe and comfortable.

The monitoring system that Klub Verboten and E1 have put in place is not just about the safety of the club-goers. It also contributes to the safety of the public: people who are visibly inebriated or might become dangerous (touchy, loud, rowdy, too drunken - all the things I saw in that Shoreditch club) are simply removed from the club before they become an annoyance to amyone, including the neighbours. I have personally witnessed the organisers refuse entry - politely but firmly - to folks who had decided to not be on their best behaviour for the evening. This is in addition to the strict verification procedures to gain entry and the so-called "klub rules" (prolifically displayed everywhere, including in written communication, emails, but also at the door and inside the club), which very specifically make me feel safer and the strict enforcement of which makes it practically understood that antisocial behaviours are not tolerated.

Now, I am not writing you this letter simply to let you know of my appreciation for the sort of events that happen at E1. I am also writing to voice my concern about the archaic nudity/semi-nudity licensing condition that I hear hinders the venue's ability to host more of these safe events where I can feel most comfortable in London.

The question of this licensing condition concerns me greatly for a number of reasons, some of them personal and some of them based around my community. Personally, I find the rule archaic and offensive: it suggests that a private, ticketed event, that I attend for entertainment only, has a profoundly negative effect on the Tower Hamlets borough, purely based on the state of dress of the attendees (again, in this private setting!) I cannot disagree more: not just as an attendee, but as a resident of Tower Hamlets. On the contrary, I think this event contributes to public safety, the economy and the culture of the borough.

Moreover, the nudity condition clearly does not understand gender expression as it already exists in 2022: what is a non-cis or trans person to do with this regulation? Who is to say if they should keep their bra on or not? I wouldn't wish that any of the people in my community have to experience intense discomfort hased on such a dated condition.
