They have also had 35 out of 41 scheduled drop-ins. These have taken place in the streets of Tower Hamlets, local cafes, hostels and within the base of partner organisations.

They have provided 3 serious conflict mediation support with pupils in the school, including an external young person.								
	It will be good to understand what school they are working with, as well as any case study examples. Osmani Trust recently attended a meet and greet event at the Town Hall where they shared details of their workshops and the types of work they do to build emotional resilience. For the sake of reporting back on this quarter's monitoring, they could have provided more information here. I will arrange a separate meeting with them to discuss case studies as well as a small discrepancy between them reporting 15 young people registered, but then reporting 14 students thereafter.								
	Osmani Trust will deliver their event in December 2024, where they expect 230 young people. KPI 1 is expected to be met then. KPI 2 suggests, 14 achieved from the annual target of 32 young people. KP1 3 suggests, 14 young people are expected to complete their survey in August 2024, which will help inform the impact made and confirm if KPI 3 has been met.
